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MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST—Browned figs, cereal, milked eggs, cinnamon toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cream of tomato soup, croquettes, shrimp and celery salad, chocolate-ice pudding, lemonade.

DINNER—Stuffed pork chops, grilled sweet potatoes, creamed onions, apple and cheese salad, cranberry sherbet, crisp cookies, milk, coffee.

This season of the year it seems particularly easy to get into a salad rut. Head lettuce is so good and it's so easy to cut it in quarters and serve it with Thousand Island or Russian or French or chiffonade dressing that one is apt to overlook the tempting combinations that add variety and make for economy.

This dinner salad is rather out-of-the-ordinary but very good.

Apple and Cheese Salad
Two apples, 2 tender blades of celery, 5 tablespoons cottage cheese, 1 green pepper, 1 canned pimiento, mayonnaise, lettuce.

Choose rather tart, juicy apples. Pare and core. Chop with celery until fine and thoroughly mixed. Add cottage cheese and season with salt, a little less than one-fourth teaspoon should be enough. Mix lightly but thoroughly and pile roughly on four beds of lettuce arranged on salad plates. Sprinkle with paprika and garnish with threads of green pepper and snips of pimiento. Serve with mayonnaise.

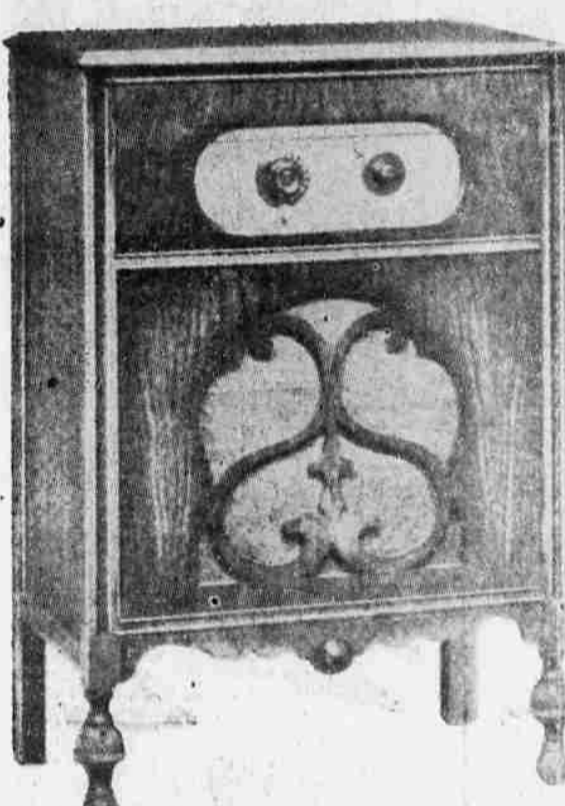

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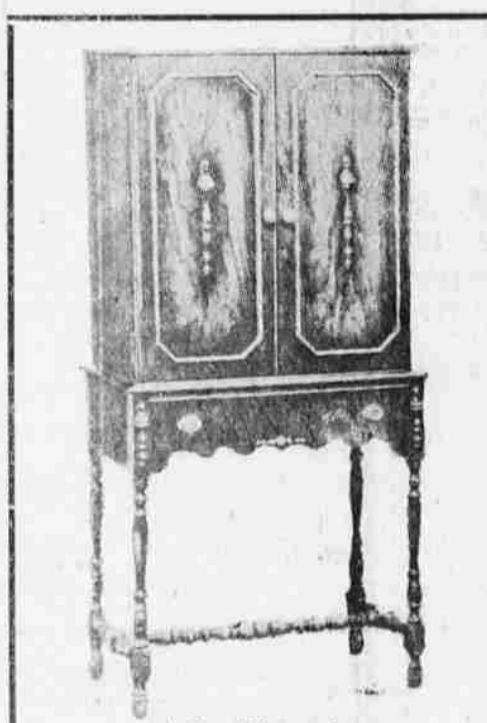
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17 HORSES BURIED
COLLINSVILLE, 10, Dec. 5 (AP)—Seventeen race horses, including "Tribal" the popular favorite at the Fairmount jockey club during 1927 and a scratched entry in last May's Kentucky Derby were buried today when they strayed one of the 18 turns on the track. The loss was \$22,000.
