The army is allotted \$444,455,222, an increase of \$21,955,052. Of this increase \$20,000,000 is based on a deficiency for 1928, leaving an actual increase for 1929 of \$12,955,052. This is due, the executive said, to automatic advance of officers to higher pay, an increase in the officer strength of the army in order to provide air corps officers, an increase in the amount for the housing program, an increase in the amount for the air corps provided under the five year expansion program and an increase in the amounts required for flood control work on the Mississippi and Sacramento rivers.
The aviation activities of the government draw \$140,621,524 in the estimates.

Reduction Notes
For the second time since national prohibition became a law a reduction in the amount of the appropriation for its enforcement is estimated. The amount asked for the bureau for next year was reduced by \$56,364. The estimate cost of the bureau for 1929 was \$12,094,149.

Requirements of reduction in the public debt, and interest on the public debt added more than a billion dollars to the budget total.
The postoffice department was allotted a total of \$116,293,225 an increase of \$11,504,430; the department of agriculture expenditures for 1929 were estimated at \$157,016,331, an increase of \$4,588,776, while the department of commerce estimated expenditures were \$38,469,745, and increase of \$17,567,559.

The estimates of cost of the treasury department for the next year was placed at \$341,658,815, an increase of \$19,359,539 over this year's estimated cost.
Provision is made in the estimates for carrying on the \$250,000,000 public buildings program with a total of \$28,946,000 to meet the 1929 requirements.

Institutions Have Some Money Left

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 5 (AP)—For the two-year appropriation period ending December 31 five of the eleven state institutions will have surplus funds to revert to the state general fund, according to reports made to the state board of control.
The Eastern Oregon state hospital for insane at Pendleton, which received an appropriation of \$146,000 from the 1927 legislature, will turn back about \$45,000.

TO TALK DEATH PENALTY
LONDON, Dec. 5 (AP)—The House of Commons by the narrowest of majorities, agreed late today to consider a bill for the abolition of capital punishment and the substitution of penal servitude for life.

KEEP THE ROOM AIR IN MOTION AND TEMPERATURE AT 68 OR 70

Ventilation has been the subject of much research by the U. S. Public Health Service as well as certain other health and research organizations. It has been found that the most comfortable temperature as well as the most healthful one is between 68 and 70 degrees. There should be a slight amount of air motion in all rooms such as is produced by a small window opening. If the temperature is kept between 68 and 70 degrees the moisture of the air, or as it is called,

erely known, the humidity, will be kept at a satisfactory point from the health viewpoint.

Scientific studies have shown that a room temperature over 70 degrees may not be healthful because the overheating produces a slight increase in body temperature as well as the pulse rate and the breathing rate; because the blood pressure falls, and there may be a decrease in the efficiency of the blood circulation system.
Studies have been made in schools in which the rooms were kept at 65.5 and 66.5 degrees. They showed that there was 70 per cent more colds among the pupils in the higher temperature rooms than among those in the rooms maintained at 65.5 degrees.

The proper way to ventilate the home is to provide an accurate thermometer in each living room. This should always be maintained at 68 to 70 degrees by regulating the supply of heat and by keeping the windows open slightly. The slightly opened window will produce a sufficient air movement in the room so as to be stimulating and refreshing and the room will feel comfortable and not stuffy. With a little experience it is possible to maintain these conditions.
