

ROBERTS BEATS BAKER BULLDOG

Bud Woodfin Wins from
Kid Alabama in Second
Six-round Headliner

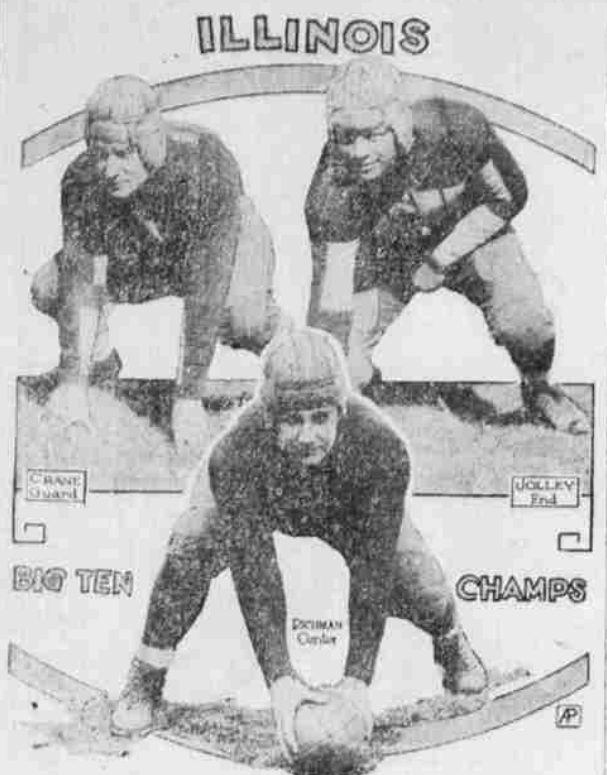
Bulldog Woodfin, of Baker, had a clear edge over Dick Roberts, of Pendleton, until the third round last night, winning the Unatilla scrap with a plain and fancy assortment of uppercuts and turning his chest to a bright pink with short punches. But the third round was different—and then there wasn't any more.

Bulldog, playing to the crowd in the opinion of many fans, fought with his chin once too often, and Dick smashed a vicious punch to the point, and a few seconds later Referee O. D. Scott gave the fight to the Pendletonian on a technical knockout.

That first smash put Bulldog down, so groggy that he came back up staggering. Dick let him have another and he popped down—and up—again. A third smash hit Bulldog and Scott pointed Roberts' forehead glove and the crowd cheered approval. Roberts was knocked for a count of nine in the first round.

Bud Woodfin Wins Nod
The Woodfin-Roberts mix was the second six-round main event at the Jefferson avenue boxing ring last night. In the first headliner, Bud Woodfin, also of Baker, won a decision over Kid Alabama, of La Grande, in a hard fought battle that brought the fans to their feet several times. The first round was slow but in the second both boys began slugging. In the fourth Bud began to pile up an advantage and clearly won the fifth and sixth. Illini Third Big Ten Team To Lose Game But Win Title

CHICAGO (AP)—Out of the eleven teams that played in the history of the Western Conference, a gallant Illinois eleven emerged with its sixth gridiron title and became the third Big Ten team to establish a clear claim to first place for two successive seasons.

Five teams, half the membership of the conference, faced a title chance on the final day of the season, but the Illini pulled a stride away from the field by eliminating Ohio by 8 to 0 as Minnesota wrecked the hopes of Wisconsin in a 6 to 0 game and Michigan by 13 to 7. In the get-away fray at Ann Arbor.

The 1928 Illini started by defeating Indiana by 13 to 7 and Northwestern by 6 to 0, and then is one of the first setbacks Kid Alabama has encountered since he started fighting here several months ago.

Three snappy preliminaries opened the card, leaving the crowd in good humor for the two final clashes. Sandy Anderson and Eddie Hall fought to a four-round draw in the curtain raiser and Orval Anderson and Glen Ford followed their lead with another even-scoring affair. Brick Anderson, 135, and Ruddle Sans, 140, made it three straight by breaking even in the third round of the evening. Both boys connected with several knucky punches.

This was the second regular semi-monthly card held in the new arena. Phil H. Williams is matchmaker.

A. P. East Coast All-Star Teams Published Today

NEW YORK, Dec. 5 (AP)—Less difference of opinion than has been the case in other years was expressed in the consensus of two score experts who assisted the Associated Press in the selection of the 1928 all-eastern football team. Sports writers and coaches who picked the all-stars in the past were agreed largely on a majority of the positions.

Only one selection failed to include the elusive Christian Keener Cagle, the Army halfback, and only two could not see Kenneth Strong, the first and powerful New York university star as a member of the backfield. Howard Harpster, Carnegie Tech's sure passer and field general ran far ahead in the vote for quarterback and Paul Scott, Pennsylvania's versatile captain, maintained a commanding lead for the fullback position. Scott and Strong were given votes for both halfback and fullback places.

Glenn Warner's mighty Stanford football eleven had a field day with the Army but the coach of the California acquired a healthy respect for one Mr. Christian Keener Cagle, halfback ace and captain of the Callets. In fact, Warner rates the Army red-head as the best backfield player he has seen on either side of the continent.

"My teams now have played against both Cagle and Chuck Carroll, the University of Washington backfield star," ruminated the old fox of the coaching game. "They're a couple of great players, no mistake."

"Carroll is bigger and heavier but Cagle is niftier. Carroll is a great straight-ahead runner and Cagle is probably better in a broken field. The Washington player is the kind that never loses ground. You can always count on him to make a gain of some kind, but probably Cagle could do the same under similar conditions. The Army back takes more chances."
