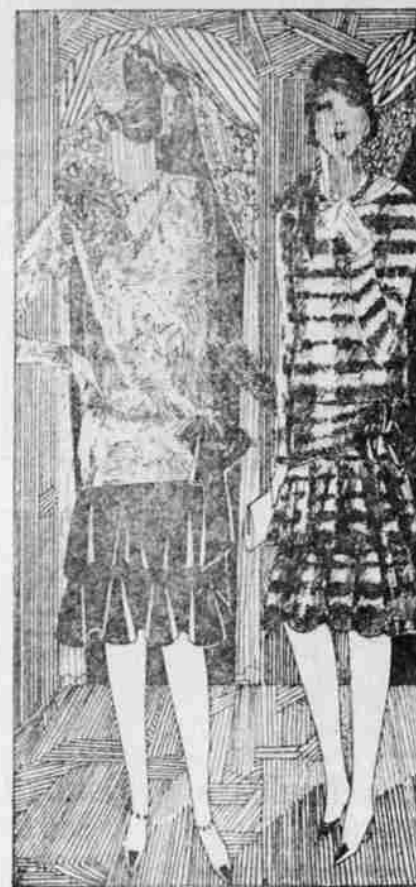

Legion In Favor Of Cruiser Bill

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Dec. 6.—Ben R. Fisher, department commander of the American Legion, has just received a letter from the national commander of the legion, Paul V. McNutt, calling upon every legionnaire in this state to actively support President Coolidge's naval strengthening program "as the only answer other nations will understand."

"The president declared in no uncertain terms in his address last night that adequate national defense necessitates the immediate construction of more cruisers for the navy," the national commander wrote. "It was America's answer to the failure of the Geneva conference. It is the only answer which the other nations of the world will understand."

"The legion must heartily endorse the president's clear-cut statement of American policy. We must look to our part in educating the public on the necessity of carrying out the naval program,"



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
