

College Has 25 Lean Years And Then Is Undefeated This Fall



They stick to their tasks out on the broad prairies of North Dakota. They stuck to the game of football at the University of North Dakota through 25 years of reverses. Their reward came in a near-perfect record in 1928. Coach West and two of his stars are above.

GRAND FORKS, N. D. (AP)—Some football teams go on and on, winning consistently each season. This is a story about one of the other teams, a team that for 25 years lost as often as it won and sometimes, after a team which after all these barren years has come to the front with its first unbeaten record since 1902.

The school is the University of North Dakota at Grand Forks. Not disheartened by its previous failures to break into the winning column, North Dakota built a stadium to seat 15,000 people in 1927 and in line with this progressive step it engaged three new coaches for the current campaign. These were Jack West, who had lost only 17 games out of 100 in nine years coaching at South Dakota State; Clyde Starbuck, his greatest pupil at South Dakota State, and L. L. "Tiny" Lewis, the former North-western fullback.

The inspiration furnished by the stadium, and more particularly by the new coaching system, worked an instant elixir of life, so far as North Dakota's football fortunes were concerned. Without a gridiron championship since 1902, the giant Nordlaks triumphed over opposition and won the North Central conference title for the first time in history and outside of one tie conflict with Carleton college of Minnesota retained its clean record.

Cherished by its success this fall, North Dakota will branch into the international field in 1929, according to Coach West, who has at hand offers of games from Calicut at Hamilton, New York, and from Oregon at Eugene. West expects to play either of these teams, as well as Minnesota, Haskell Indians, South Dakota State and others.

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IVORY MARKET IS PUSHING TICKER

Sixty-two Baseball Deals Recorded During the Last Three Days

NEW YORK, Dec. 7. (AP)—More or less unquiet during the playing season, the baseball market where "ivory" is bought and sold with reckless abandon, is booming along at its peak right now. The "ticker" has been able to keep up with all sales so far but it's been taxed to the limit. Whenever baseball men gather in large quantities, as they have at Toronto, buying and selling of players becomes a favorite indoor sport.

62 Change Hands
A more or less complete count shows that no fewer than 62 players have changed hands in the past three days. Most of these deals, of course, were completed at Toronto where the annual meeting of the national association of professional baseball clubs now is in session.

While the convention itself is directly concerned only with minor league matters, the boys from the American and National circuits have been out in force, buying and selling in their eternal effort to "do better next year."

No far few outstanding major league players have been affected by the transactions. But there are rumors of trades to come that may effect a wholesale shifting in the major league lineups next season.

The Detroit Tigers completed the most sensational deal, buying First Baseman Dale Alexander and Pitcher Johnny Prudden from Toronto of the International league, for about \$100,000 in cash and three players. Toronto gets First Baseman Sweeney and two pitchers not yet selected.

The Boston Red Sox wanted Catcher Alex Gaston and Outfielder Russell Scarritt from St. Paul and swung the deal by giving the Saints Bryan Harries, tall right-hander, Third Baseman Bill Rogell, and an unnamed catcher.

Four former major league stars look on managerial work. Alan Rothson, a good pitcher in his day, will handle Louisville's team in the American association. Gabby Street, Walter Johnson's old catcher, was hired by the St. Louis Cardinals to handle one of their "farms."

Jack Bentley signed to manage York of the New York-Pennsylvania league and Helene Groh, who didn't have much luck at Charlotte in the South Atlantic circuit last season, will take another managerial whiff at Hartford of the Eastern league.

Mission Gardener Sold
Evar Swanson, San Francisco Mission's outfielder, was sold to the Cincinnati Reds who also bought Herbie Nels from Seattle, probably for use at Columbus which is controlled by the Reds.

The Browns sold Pitcher Walter Berk and First Baseman Guy Sturdy, the former to Buffalo and

the latter to Birmingham. The Phils sent Pitchers Walsh and Miller to Los Angeles, and outfielder Art Jahn to Portland. The San Francisco Mission took Eddie Mulligan, infielder, off Pittsburgh's hands.

Cleveland parted with cash and two players for Jim Zinn, Kansas City pitcher. Ray Blades got word that the Cardinals were sending him to Rochester in party payment for Charley Gelbert, star shortstop.

Holling Goes to Angels
The Boston Braves sold Howard Freigan, infielder, to Toledo, while the Red Sox were disposing of Pitcher Carl Holling to Los Angeles.

That about completed the deals as they affected the major leagues. Right now most of the interest seems to revolve about Buddy Myer, Red Sox third baseman, Ossie Blizze, who guards the hot corner at Washington, and Pete Donohue and Adolf Luque of Cincinnati's mound staff. Rumors had Myer going to the New York Yankees; Donohue or Luque or both to the New York Giants, while it was understood that Blizze was on the market for the highest bidder. Officially, the club concerned knew nothing whatever about these rumors.
