MENUS

BREAKFAST—California grapes, cereal, cream, ham, toast, extra toast, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—English monkey, stewed tomatoes, Dutch apple cake, milk, tea.
DINNER—Veal cutlets, potatoes au gratin, squash croquettes, stuffed prune salad, canned peaches, coconut cake, milk, coffee.

When grimes are used without stewing they should be thoroughly scrubbed and scalded. Let stand in cold water for an hour or two to soften if very hard and dry. Drain and pat dry between towels before removing stones and stuffing cavities. A mixture of cream cheese and nut cheese, marmalade and nuts or cheese alone are suggestions for stuffing.

Ham Toast
One and one-half cups left-over cooked ham, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 cups milk, 1 egg, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 4 squares toast.

Melt butter in frying pan. Add ham and shake until mixed. Stir over flour and stir with fork until flour is absorbed. Add milk, stirring constantly. Bring to the boiling point and add parsley. Cook five minutes, stirring to keep smooth and prevent sticking. Remove from the fire and beat in egg. Pour over hot toast and serve at once.

Any kind of left-over minced sausage can be used in place of the ham.

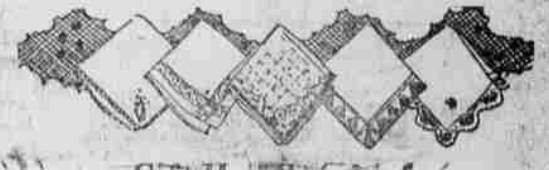
