The activities of the domestic science and art departments of the La Grande high school are flourishing this season with a total of more than 200 high school and grade school girls enrolled in sewing and cooking courses.

In January a course in advanced domestic art is to be added to the curriculum. Sewing on silk and wool in the form of dresses, suits and coats will be the work of the class.

About 70 students and teachers are served every day at the cafeteria conducted by Miss Iona Ruth Harriman. The noon luncheons are served by the cafeteria class every day from 11:45 to 12:45 o'clock.

Many pretty dresses and other articles of wearing apparel have been completed by the classes in sewing, conducted by Miss Anne Arnold. By the end of the semester the advanced class will have made three dresses each.

Miss Arnold has 77 high school and 39 grade school pupils. Her biggest class is the beginning one which has an enrollment of 40 students.

Miss Harriman has 22 pupils in beginning domestic science class, 25 in home management, 30 grade school pupils and 10 in the cafeteria class.

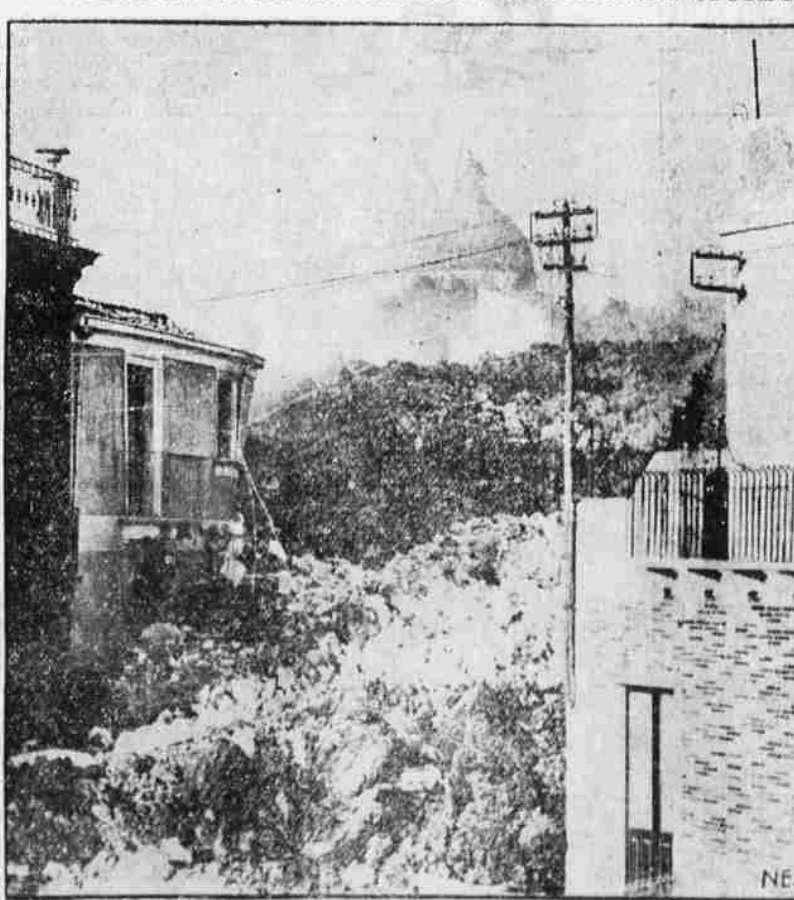
