Kinkajou Shown To Californians

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 11 (AP)—Day from Guayaquil, Ecuador, and day from Guayaquil, Ecuador, and what do you suppose he had with him, boys and girls? A Kinkajou. A Kinkajou, it seems, is something of a cross between a cub bear, a monkey, and a raccoon with a dash of kangaroo and a trace of anteater in its make-up.

"While the City Sleeps" Lon Chaney's latest contribution to the screen, now showing at the Star theater will surely give those Chaney fans who are accustomed to almost any surprise in the work of the "man of a thousand faces."

Not only does he play a role almost the opposite of anything he has ever played in his career, but the story itself is an amazing sequence of thrills and heart throbs; sensational adventure and battle contrasted to delicate and intimate human touches.

In the new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer underworld drama "Chaney" is seen as a plainclothes detective in a vivid battle against a horde of gangsters, on one side, and a romantic love affair on the other. He veers from hard-boiled Nemesis of the crime element to a tender lover; his great sacrifice at the close of the dramatic story is tempered with prospects of another sensational adventure in the sinister shadows of a city.

The story is an intimate view of the inside of New York police headquarters, written by A. P. Younger and directed in a masterly manner by Jack Conway.
