NORMAL SCHOOL VALUES TO THIS CITY DISCUSSED

that the school will be a material aid to business. He expressed the belief that normal school students and faculty members, through their expenditures in La Grande, will have the same bearing on business here as would a simple payroll.

Approximately half a million dollars leaves La Grande each year in outside investments and of this amount, it is doubtful if more than four-fifths ever returns. H. E. Dixon, attorney, said in a talk on inducements offered local investors by outside capital. His figures did not include sums of money put into so-called "wildcat" investments.

Mr. Dixon spoke of investment funds in general and also of building and loan associations which are conducted on the penalty system. He compared these investments with those offered locally, wherein the investor not only receives all of his money when he desires to do so, but also a fair share of interest on the principal he has invested. This is not always true of outside investments, he asserted.

The next speaker, Sherwood Williams, who is president of the Northwest Real Estate association, gave a very interesting talk on "Home Earning and Credits." Mr. Williams said: "The man who owns his home is worthy of credit to his limit. He is an asset to the community," adding that credit bureaus do not spend much time worrying about home owners. Mr. Williams indicated that building and loan associations, such as the one in La Grande, make home ownership possible to many who would otherwise have to live in rented buildings, and assist greatly in up-building the community.

The man who lives in a rented house and sings "Home, Sweet Home" is kidding himself and serenading the landlord," Mr. Williams declared.

Speaking on behalf of Dr. Richardson, J. J. Carr, in a brief statement, said he believes it is the duty of people of La Grande to take part in the local building and loan so as to put it in the class of a community enterprise operating for the benefit of both investor and borrower. Before adjourning the session, Mr. Hill declared that the La Grande Building & Loan association should be placed in the foreground as a community project. "It will mean as much as anything else we can build," he said.

formation was framed after the five specialists had been with His Majesty about one hour in the early afternoon.

Public Startled.
The British public which has been watching with tense anxiety every move around the palace was startled by the tidings and seemed generally at a loss what to make of them. There was much relief that the bulletin was accompanied by the clause that slight improvement had been maintained.

The medical correspondent of the Evening News, discussing the bulletin said:

"This afternoon's bulletin discloses rather a serious aspect of the case but it may not be so serious as it appears at first sight. Any extensive drainage will be effected by a little tube at the chest or the removal of a small portion of the rib. The news is something of a setback but we shall probably be able to judge better of the importance of the development from the night bulletin. It is a good factor that the slight improvement in the general condition is still maintained."

The seriousness of His Majesty's condition was indicated by the fact that his five physicians remained in consultation for more than two hours at the palace this afternoon.

QUEEN UNVEILS MEMORIAL.
LONDON, Dec. 12 (AP)—Despite anxiety over the illness of her royal husband, Queen Mary gave renewed evidence today of her devotion to duty. She motored from Buckingham palace into the city of London and for the first time unveiled a war memorial—one to members of mercantile and fishing fleets who were lost at sea in the world war.

Incidentally the occasion was the day on which the queen's eldest son, Prince George, was born.

The entire ceremony was broadcast.

GEORGE STARTS HOME.
LONDON, Dec. 12 (AP)—Prince George, who has been serving aboard the H. M. S. Durban, left Bermuda this morning for New York. He will leave New York on the Berengia which sails for England Friday.

PRINCE VISITS FATHER.
LONDON, Dec. 12 (AP)—The Prince of Wales, back in England again after his dramatic 5,000-mile dash from equatorial Africa, spent an hour and a half at Buckingham palace this afternoon.

The heir apparent drove from his home, York House, at noon today and went immediately to the palace where his father, King George, is lying gravely ill. He remained there until about 1:30 and then drove back to York House.

today that the police had been active for a week in picking up suspects. These suspects will be confined until after the departure of Mr. Hoover. The authorities not only are determined to prevent any plots against Mr. Hoover but also any public demonstrations against the United States.

Since the bombing of the National City bank on Christmas eve last year, when two persons were killed and 20 injured, police vigilance in guarding the United States embassy and consulate, the American Club and buildings housing American firms has not been relaxed.

CROSSING MOUNTAINS.
LOS ANDES, Chile, Dec. 12 (AP)—President-elect Hoover today was crossing the Andes mountains on a special train enroute from Santiago to Buenos Aires. He traveled over one of the highest transcontinental railroad routes in either of the Americas carrying his mission of friendship and understanding across one of the mightiest barriers known to man.

From Los Andes to the terminal at Mendoza the total length of the trans-Andean railway is approximately 151 miles. Its highest point is 10,312 feet above sea level and it provided Mr. Hoover with the opportunity of studying one of the greatest engineering feats in the world.

Mr. Hoover in crossing the Andes completed his travels to the only important region in the world that he had never visited before.

The train was carried over the mountain by a rack system. On the Chilean side the line has been electrified, the energy being obtained from large water power plants near Santiago.

Through Long Tunnel.
Continuing to the summit of the mountain the road ran through a tunnel nearly two miles long and the train in passing through this tunnel crossed the border between Argentina and Chile.

Mr. Hoover bade farewell to Chile after exchanging farewell expressions of friendship between the United States and Chile with his host, President Baner. At a luncheon which was the climax of the Chilean welcome, President Baner said that the national spirit of the United States had given to the world incalculable benefits and an even greater hope for future spiritual and material advancement between the peoples of both continents.

which he praised the achievement of the Wright brothers.

"Others, whose names will long be remembered, had done much to solve the problem," he said. "But it remained for the able, persistent and modest brothers from Dayton to demonstrate completely the possibility of a machine carrying itself by its own power and crossing a man in sustained flight."

Turning to the widespread use of the airplane today and its rapid development in recent years, Mr.

COOLIDGE SAID THAT THE "WONDERFUL AND SPECTACULAR FLIGHT TO PARIS" OF COLONEL CHARLES A. LINDBERGH AND HIS SUBSEQUENT COUNTRY-WIDE TOUR, HAD DONE "MUCH TO MAKE AMERICA AIR-MINDED." The nineteenth century was the railroad and steamboat age, he said, while the twentieth "will be known for the development of aeronautics and air transport."

Means Much to U. S.
"Air transport means much to the United States," he said. "Divided as it is in the west by lofty mountain ranges and deserts. In the early days it took six months to go from Missouri to the Pacific coast. An airplane has traveled across the continent in less than 24 hours. We are stretching out our arms through the air to Canada and to our friends and neighbors on the south."

Orville Wright, the first man to fly, is guest of honor at the conference, to which 40 nations have sent representatives. Col. Lindbergh was seated with the 12 members of the American delegation, appointed by President Coolidge to represent the United States in the three-day discussion of world aeronautical problems.
