DOMESTIC GRAIN MARKET STEADY

Government Report for Week Shows Demand Absorbing Offerings

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (Spe-
cial).—The domestic grain market
held generally steady during the
week ending December 8 with de-
mand sufficiently active to absorb
the moderate offerings, according
to the weekly grain market review
of the United States Bureau of ag-
ricultural economics. Premiums
for wheat were somewhat reduced
for the high protein types but most
offerings were readily taken. In-
creased deliveries on December
contracts caused an increase in
commercial stocks in store in the
markets. Corn receipts were fairly
heavy but country offerings were
not large and stocks showed only a
moderate increase. Prices were
practically unchanged. Oats con-
tinued independently firm, principal-
ly as a result of small offer-
ings while barley held steady. Rye
was slightly lower and flax de-
clined on slow demand and lower
Argentine prices.

The prospective increase in of-
ferings of Southern Hemisphere
wheat caused continued weak mar-
ket at Liverpool but harvesting in
Argentina has been somewhat de-
layed by rains in the northern part
of the belt while India is report-
ed taking some Australian wheat
which offset somewhat the influ-
ence of the new crop offerings. In-
dian wheat average is reported to
be slightly larger than a year ago
while the area sown to winter
crops in Russia is estimated to
be about the same as last year.
The condition of the Russian crops
at the end of November, how-
ever, was reported at about 26 per cent
above an average condition. In-
dian marketing continues heavy
and around 120,000,000 bushels of
Canadian wheat is reported in store
in the Canadian and United States
markets. This, together with the
140,000,000 bushels of United States
wheat, makes about 260,000,000
bushels of wheat in store in North
American markets.

Mills are still furnishing the
most important outlet for United
States wheat, although some white
wheat from the Pacific Northwest,
some classes of durum and some
of the lower grades of hard winter
wheat are being exported. South-
western mills reported an increase
in shipping instructions for flour.

Eggs Are Down Two Cents More In Portland, Ore.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 12 (AP).—
Eggs were down another two
cents on the local market in all
classes except under-sized, which
remain steady at 21 cents. Fresh
standard extras were quoted today
at 40 cents top price, standard
firsts at 35 cents, medium extras
at 33 and medium firsts at 34
cents.
There were no changes in butter
and poultry quotations.
Turkey receipts have been moder-
ate with price level steady at 32
to 34 cents for No. 1 dressed stock.
Slight changes were noted in coun-
try dressed meats. Choice veal is
one half cent weaker at 19 cents.
Pork is firmer at 12 1/2 to 13 cents
a pound.
Fruit and vegetable markets re-
main fairly steady with low prices
on oranges. Holiday shoppers may
buy these at 25 to 25 cents a do-
zen. Box prices ran from \$4.50 to
\$5.50. Grapefruit was plentiful
and in fine condition. A good sup-
ply of Jap oranges was on the local
market. Selected walnuts, fruits
and nuts ready for Christmas ship-
ment were proving a popular spec-
ialty with the holiday trade.
