14-STORY FALL CAUSES DEATH OF NEW YORKER

INDIANA FIELD HOUSE LARGE AS GRIDIRON

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP)—Profits from athletics will pay for Indiana University's new field house, to be dedicated December 13 with a basketball game between the Crimson and the University of Pennsylvania, champion of the Eastern league.

MILK A "PROTECTIVE" FOOD FOR CHILDREN

The most important foundation upon which to build children's diet is the allowance of one quart of milk per child each day. The necessity for this allowance increases with the necessity for economy in the food budget, for no one food contains such a proportionate assembly of the elements needed for the growing body. For this reason the term "protective food" has been applied to milk.

The protein or body building element of milk is of the highest quality and is unexcelled in its ability to promote growth. In addition to this it has been found that normally this same element is the most completely digested and most efficiently absorbed of all protein foods.

The mineral content of milk is particularly adapted to offset any shortages encountered through the use of fats and highly refined carbohydrates, so greatly used in American diets and by necessity in all economical diets. Calcium (or lime) and phosphorus are minerals of vital importance. They prevent rickets, build strong rigid bones and teeth, give to the blood its ability to coagulate or clot in provision most necessary in case of cuts or abrasions of the skin, and many other functions. Some very interesting experiments on mineral storage have been made by feeding three children aged 4, 5, and 12 years respectively different amounts of milk. In all three children the best calcium storage was found when one quart of milk was supplied. It was also observed that better storage was obtained by giving this mineral in the form of milk than when one half the milk was replaced by vegetables of equal calcium content. To substitute vegetables for the full allowance of calcium is practically impossible since no child could consume the necessary amount of vegetables.

In addition to these merits whole milk shares the advantage of adding to the fuel or energy value of the school child's diet, a provision most important in cases of poor appetite or underweight. Whole milk also belongs to the group of food essentials known as vitamins. The advocated allowance of a quart of milk a day is practically a guarantee against any deficiency of either vitamin A or vitamin B provided the cream is not poured off for adult use.
