Mrs. Moss has recently constructed a new two room 20x10 foot which has included in it all the modern ideas for such a building, and in addition it is a larger proof, that is, the plan has an alarm system connected with other buildings and which on trials has worked 100%. Three units of a new Southwest Giant incubator have been received, having a capacity of 1000 eggs. The entire plant, when it is all in, has a 26,000 egg capacity. This incubator will be operated along with other machines which have equipped the hatchery years past. Mrs. Moss expects to set these machines about the first of the year and will have the seven popular breeds, single combs, white feathers, single combs, barred rocks, single combs Rhode Island reds, black Jersey game, and buff orpingtons. Mrs. Avery's hatchery is connected with 5 other hatcheries in other locations and their limits will be 50,000 chicks.

Saratoga Snuts Pudding.

1 lb. suet
1 cup molasses
1 teaspoon soda
1 cup sour milk
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon butter
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 pound raisins
1/2 pound currants

Cook suet, dissolve soda in a little water and add to molasses. Mix well with the suet, then add milk, the flour, salt and spices. Lastly add the raisins and currants which have been well floured. Put in greased mold. Roll continuously for three hours.

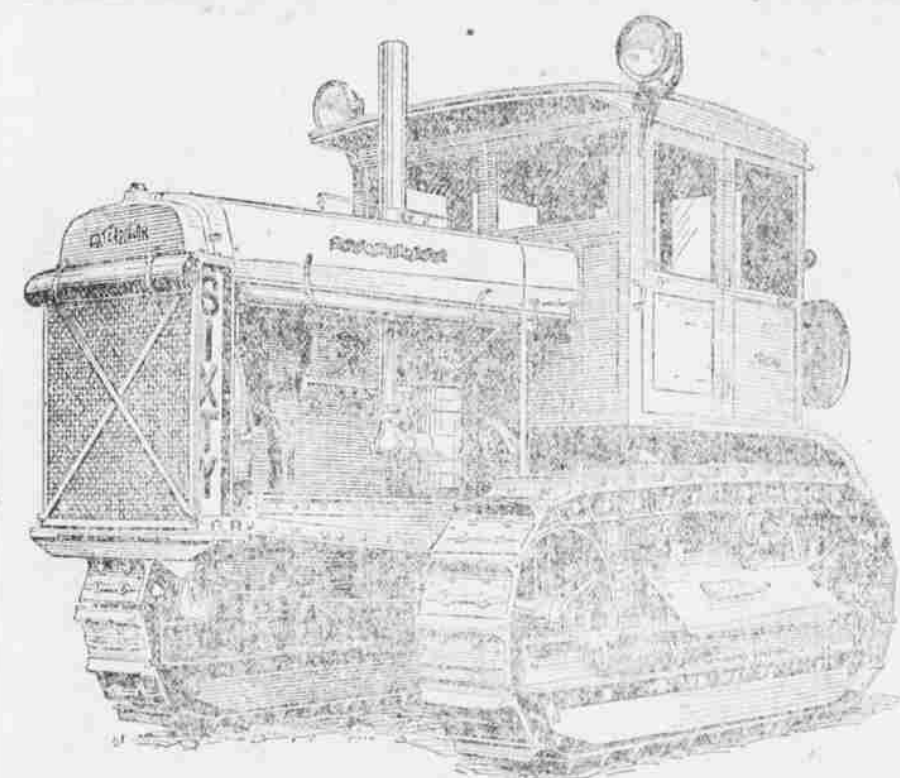
