ROBERTS LOSES TO BROTHERTON

Pendleton Man Stopped in Sixth; Boxing Card One of Best of Year

Dick Roberts, middleweight from Pendleton, who shipped Bulldog Woodfin, of Baker, two weeks ago, met a conqueror here last night in Mike Brotherton, of Walla Walla, and lost in the sixth round of a scheduled eight-round main event when he could no longer defend himself against the Washington fighter's attack. Brotherton had the advantage practically all of the way, fans report.

Ed Alabama, of La Grande, came back with vengeance last night and took a decision over Mickey Dugan, of Walla Walla, in a snappy six-round main event. The going was fast most of the fight. Before he awarded the decision to Alabama, referee O. D. Scott complimented Dugan on his sportsmanship, fans report. Bud Woodfin challenged the winner of this bout.

Three four-round events, presided over by the referee, featured the entire card on one of the best of the year. Ted Allen, of La Grande, won a decision over Jimmy Kelly, of Walla Walla, although Kelly landed a smashing blow just before the final bell. The scrap between Wally Scott, of Walla Walla, and Buck Anderson, of La Grande, was believed by many to merit "feature" honors. Slugging for the most of the time, the two boys kept the spectators in an uproar. Scott finally won on a knockout in the third round. Eddie Hall and Sandy Anderson fought a four-round draw. Both boys are La Grander.

Hoppe To Play Johnny Layton For World Title

CHICAGO, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Willie Hoppe, who, for almost a quarter of a century, has been winning billiard titles tonight gets a chance to win the only one that has escaped him—the world's three-cushion crown.

Steady and yet spectacular, Hoppe has stroked his way to two triumphs in the championship round robin tournament at Orchestra hall, winning the right to meet the defending titleholder, Johnny Layton, of Dallas, Mo., in the deciding match tonight.

Ralph Greenleaf, New York, has clinched at least a tie for the pocket billiard championship, which he is defending at the two-day tournament. Victorious in his two matches, Greenleaf alone remains undefeated. Should he be upset tonight by Frank Taberski, Schenectady, N. Y., in the final match, the best he can get is a tie. Taberski, Pasquale Natale, and Kevin Rudolph, his challengers, have been defeated.

YANKEES MAY LET DUGAN GO; OTHERS TO BID

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—(AP)—"Jumping Joe" Dugan's baseball career, so far as the New York Yankees are concerned, appears to be at an end.

The third baseman, veteran of 12 American league campaigns and of five world's series, was in conference with Ed Hickey, Yankees manager yesterday and it was commonly understood that it had been agreed that since Dugan was a 19-year man his unconditional release would be given. He expects to be able to land a major league berth despite the fact that his legs have failed him of recent years. Brooklyn or Chicago, of the National league, it is understood, would be glad to obtain the former Holy Cross star's services.

GEORGIE DIXON BEATS CLEGHORN IN TEN-ROUNDER

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 19.—(AP)—Georgie Dixon, Portland's negro middleweight contender, had no trouble winning from Walter Cleghorn here last night in the ten-round main event. In spite of two former decisions in Cleghorn's favor in previous encounters, Sam Warren, St. Johns, technically stopped Dynamic Murphy, of Condon, four seconds before the close of their six round semi-final, when the referee stopped the match. Eddie Graham, Salem's 125-pounder, won from Johnny Topaz, Ellensburg, four rounds. Franky Munroe, Hood River, won over Billy Murray, Salem, by technical knockout when referee Keenan stopped the contest in the fourth. Al Konzo took an easy decision over Dobby Vernon, four rounds.

LEWIS TO DEFEND TITLE

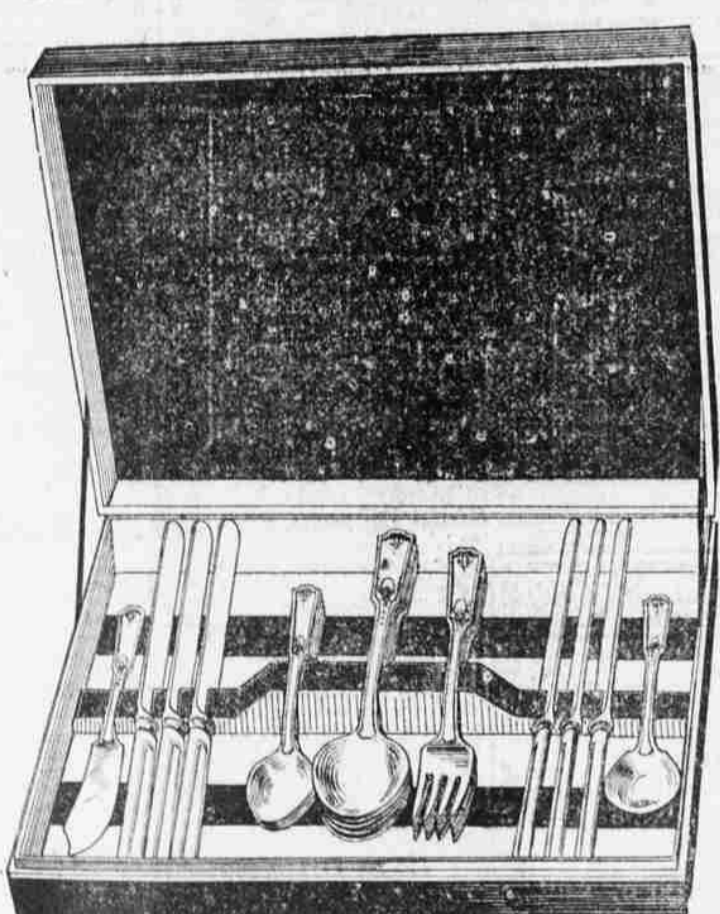

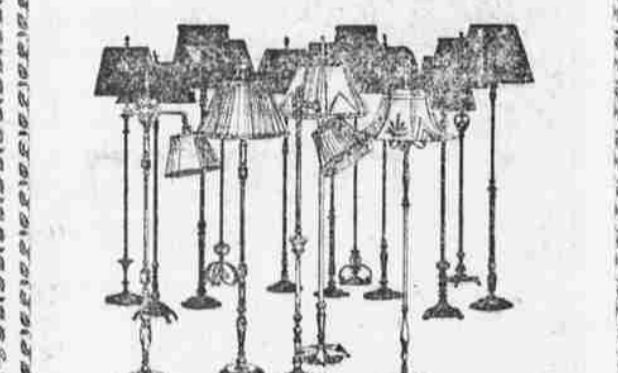
