DINNER—Round steak smothered with onions, mashed potatoes, endive with French dressing, raisin puff pudding, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Browned rice, lettuce sandwiches, apple sauce, ginger nuts, milk, tea.

BREAKFAST—Grapes, cereal, cream, poached egg and spinach on toast, extra toast, milk, coffee.

Browned Rice
One sweet green pepper, 1 onion, 4 tablespoons butter, 1 quart can tomatoes, 1 cup water, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons bacon fat, 1 cup washed rice.

Remove seeds and hilt from pepper and mince flesh very fine. Peel and mince onion. Melt butter in a large spider or shallow sauce pan, add prepared onion and pepper and rice well washed and dried. Stir until well mixed and each grain of rice is coated with butter. Cook until mixture is golden brown. Rub tomatoes through a coarse sieve to remove seeds. Add water, sifted tomatoes, salt, spices and bacon fat to rice mixture. Cook slowly and uncovered until mixture begins to thicken. Then cover and cook in a slow oven until mixture is thick. Serve very hot on a deep platter.
