The epidemic of influenza has not struck this community as severely as some, although there are several cases. Some are recovering, while others are still ill.

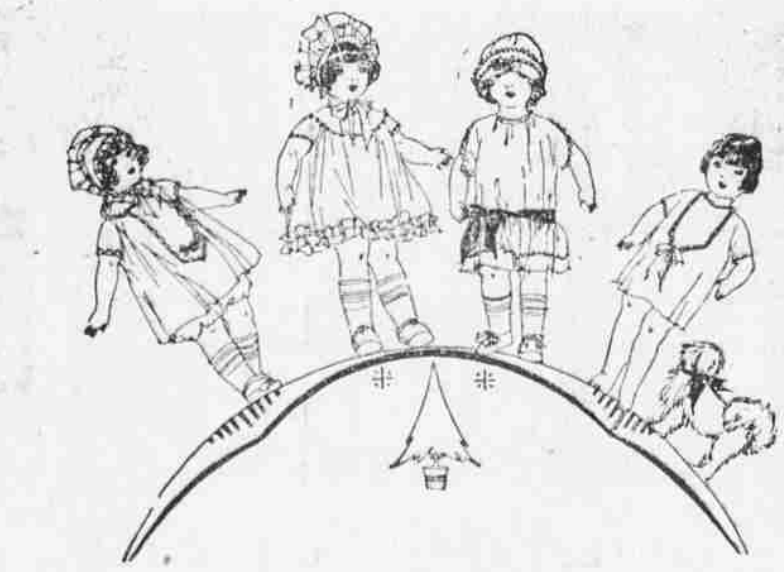
