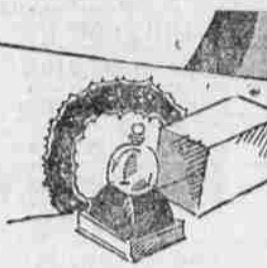

MENUS

By Sister Mary

BREAKFAST—California grapes, cereal, cream, country sausage, buckwheat pancakes, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Casseroles of beans, bean lettuce with French dressing, spice-drop cookies, canned cherries, milk, tea.

DINNER—Casseroles of rabbit, baked macaroni and tomatoes, shredded cabbage and pimento salad, date pudding, milk, coffee.

With the exception of the head lettuce and perhaps the grapes, these menus are particularly adapted to the occasionally limited resources of the country housewife.

Casseroles of Beans

One cup dried lima beans, 2 carrots, 2 onions, 2 cups canned tomatoes, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup cold chopped meat, 2 tablespoons butter.

Soak beans over night in cold water to cover. Cook until tender in salted boiling water. Scrape and slice carrots, peel and slice onions. Combine with beans which have been drained from water in which they were cooked. Heat tomatoes with sugar, salt and pepper. Simmer 10 minutes with beans, carrots and onions. Arrange meat in a well-buttered casserole and cover with vegetable mixture. Dot with bits of butter and bake 30 minutes in a hot oven.

Any kind of left-over chopped meat can be used or a combination of meats.

DIRTY MONEY PERIOD SEEN IN BILL CHANGE

WASHINGTON (AP)—There will be a "dirty money" period for Americans when the process of exchanging the new small sized currency for the present issue begins about July 1.

Issue of the present size will be suspended April 30, a house committee was told by Herriek Bond, assistant treasury secretary in charge. Between that date and July 1, bills usually regarded as unfit for circulation, and turned in by banks for treatment at the treasury money laundry or to be destroyed, will be kept at work.

ROAD-AIR SERVICE PLANNED

LONDON (AP)—British motor bus and airway operators are working out plans for coordinated passenger and freight service which will link all parts of England direct with London. The first route will be between Newcastle-on-Tyne and London, over which sleeping coaches will carry passengers intending to take airplanes leaving for the continent in the early morning. A second route will be opened between London and Manchester. In case of forced landings motor buses will make connections enabling passengers to complete their journey.

EL PASO, Texas (AP)—President Porfirio Gil of Mexico may attend the annual convention of the West Texas chamber of commerce in El Paso next May.

Right representatives of the organization made a good-will trip by airplane to Mexico City to invite the new president of the republic to El Paso.

KANSAS CITY, Kan. (AP)—Fairfax airport has underground as well as overhead importance. Two small gas wells at the north edge of the field supply fuel for heating buildings at the airport.

CHICAGO (AP)—Sales of planes at the Chicago aviation show were almost as numerous as sales ordinarily are at the national automobile shows. There was this difference, however, that the planes were purchased largely by alway operators, corporations and flying schools. 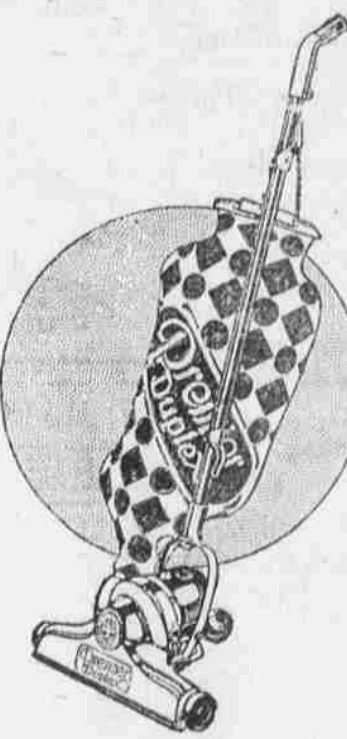

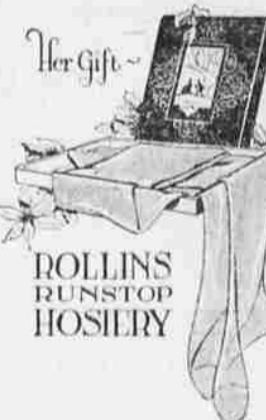
