## MENUS

BREAKFAST—Sections of grape-fruit, crisp broiled bacon, baked eggs, bran and raisin muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cream of celery soup, crostons, spinach and egg salad, baked Indian pudding, lem-onade.

DINNER—salmon chops, pota-toes au gratin, buttered string beans, cranberry salad, cheese-cups, chocolate bread pudding, milk, coffee.

Since a cream soup as well as a dessert made with milk is sug-gested in the luncheon menu lem-onade is used in place of milk.

Baked Indian pudding is a good old-fashioned dessert that is sea-sonable and hearty for this time of the year.

Baked Indian Pudding  
Two tablespoons cornmeal, 3 eggs milk, 1 tablespoon butter, 4 tablespoons molasses, 1/2 cup rais-ins, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 egg.

Mix cornmeal with 1/4 cup cold water. Heat 2 1/2 cups milk to the boiling point and stir into corn-meal. Cook over boiling water for 15 minutes. Stir in butter, molasses, raisins, salt and spices. Re-move from heat and add egg well beaten. Turn into a well buttered baking dish and pour over re-maining half cup of milk. Bake 45 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve warm with or without hard-sauces. One-fourth cup of sugar can be added with molasses and vanilla if a sweeter pudding is wanted. (Copyright, 1928, NEA Society, Inc.)
