division of limited means who can add to the Holding and Loan Fund certain amounts each month for which he receives the average interest earnings. Indirectly, it results in a thrift program which saves money for those who would otherwise not set aside a portion of their income.

While carrying all the essential features of the ordinary contract, La Grande investors in the local organization are favored in having no membership fees, no surcharges and are granted a non-forfeiture and a no-penalty clause. Consistent with well-managed financing, these additional concessions in the contract make this investment worthy of consideration by both the large and small investor.

Convicted of using the mails to defraud investors in Idaho copper stock, whose value he had boosted by the agency of his pseudo financial sheet, the Wall Street financier, he was sentenced to four years in Atlanta penitentiary and fined \$5900.

Walter C. Vorstun of Boise, Ida., president of the Idaho Copper corporation, who was convicted with Rice, was sentenced to nine months in Westchester county penitentiary. The Wall Street financier was fined \$10,000 and the Idaho copper corporation was suspended for five years. Dr. Walter Harvey Wood, proctor, was acquitted by the jury that convicted Rice and Vorstun.
