

Engineers Urge Increasing Of Clear Channels

NEW YORK (AP)—Further increase in the number of clear channels, with the use of maximum power on each channel, is urged in a review of the broadcast allocation by radio engineers.

Other recommendations are made by the engineers who comprise the committee on broadcast allocation of the radio division of the National Electrical Manufacturers' association. Members of this committee are C. W. Horn, Julius Weisberger, Dr. Alfred N. Goldsmith, Ray H. Marston, Louis R. F. Stayeroff and Edgar H. Kelly. A summary of the report, made public tonight by the association, stated:

"While the committee commends the radio commission for having reduced the number of stations broadcasting simultaneously with the effect of lessening interference, it feels that the commission has failed to accomplish the prime purpose for which it was organized—the reduction of the number of stations licensed.

"The commission is urged to adopt a standard basis for rating of broadcasting stations for the purpose of deciding the relative service of two or more stations.

"The committee reiterates its support of the engineers' plan of broadcast allocation which calls for 50 cleared channels, and originally 40. The adoption of 40 cleared channels is a step in the right direction but does not go far enough.

"Only repeal of the Davis amendment will be helpful in the present emergency. Modifying zone boundaries and the number of zones, no matter how skillfully done, cannot be a fully basis for equating the because any zoning plan is certain to discriminate against one zone or another.

"Maximum power should be used on all cleared channels so that the greatest number of listeners may be served.

"Having as an inflexible benchmark of broadcasting population the rate of receivers in all territories, the committee condemns any unwarranted restriction of chain programs.

"The committee is opposed to the publicity given by the commission to experiments in station synchronization in advance of the time that the practical problems of such synchronization are solved."

Fireplace Is History Text



A fireplace made up of stones from historic sites, each telling an important chapter in the world's history, is the possession of Joseph W. Parks of Jenkita Gap, near Altoona, Pa. The stones are numbered and a key explains their origin. As a keystone at the base of the fireplace is a stone from Colnemaugh dam—when the dam gave way the Johnstown flood disaster of 1889 was caused. Another stone is from the site of the stable in Bethlehem, where Christ was born. Still another is from the cradle of civilization on the western hemisphere—La Paz, Bolivia. The fireplace and Mr. Parks are shown above.

In spite of the popular idea, seldom cause headache. The person who complains of headache is usually one who eats irrationally, takes exercise sitting down, and fresh air in homeopathic doses, which results in a disordered gastrointestinal tract, flabby skeletal muscles, and a system short-changed on oxygen. These scars, which may well have caused the headaches, were possibly the result of an early meningitis.

HEADACHES MAY BE INSIDE OR OUTSIDE

Causes Are Various and Include "Jampering"

Headache may be inside or outside of the head. The outside headaches are really neuritis. Such pains are accompanied by tenderness and usually affect one side only.

A few of the causes for inside headaches are: overeating and drinking, hunger, high blood pressure, anemia, fever, and plethoria. Headaches, with other symptoms, are but part of symptom complexes which speak for underlying causes such as gastrointestinal and kidney diseases or some local or systemic affection or infection.

The brain is confined within a hard vault and anything that will cause increased intracranial pressure will give rise to headache. This is mechanics as applied to an increase of brain inflammatory exudate (meningitis) and new growth (brain tumor).

One of the near and frequent causes for headaches is sinusitis. The "ache" may be over frontal in type if the frontal sinuses are filled with dammed up pus, or the pain may be in back and above the eyes if the maxillary sinuses are involved.

Brain tumor and headache are so closely connected that only vomiting and choked discs are necessary to make the diagnosis more certain.

Nocturnal headache makes the consultant think of syphilis as a cause. The headache of hypertension usually is worse on arising in the

morning and subsides towards noon on account of elimination from skin, kidneys and bowels. The headache of sinusitis resembles this because drainage is best when the patient is up and clear the nose and nasopharynx. Eye strain and iridoplexus et cetera.
