time. Mr. Walker will be the best man.

Soon after the Stewards came to La Grande they built the first and only opera house in this city. It is now known as Rex hall. During those days, traveling dramatic companies were a regular thing in La Grande but the coming of the "movies" stopped that business.

The Stewards lived a while at Perry and at Summerville, they managed the Summerville hotel for two years before coming here.

Born in Utah
Mrs. Steward was born Nov. 27, 1862 at Webber Canyon, Utah, near Salt Lake City. Her parents traveled by ox team to Nevada. It was from Nevada to California with his horses that he first met her.

Mr. Steward was born Feb. 13, 1854 in St. Paul, Minn. His grandfather built the capitol building at Lincoln, Neb., in 1869.

The Stewards have besides their daughter, a grandson, David Steward, who is 25 years old and who is organist at a Chehalis theater. Mrs. Steward has several relatives in this part of the country, a

sister, Mrs. B. G. Brown, of Eagle Point, Ore., a brother, Robert Marsh, in Boise, and a niece, Mrs. Clark Ripper, of Baker.

The Stewards moved to their home in the western section of La Grande at the head of Spring avenue in 1916. They have been residents of the valley for the past 46 years.

Many Guests
All during today the Stewards have been receiving guests, for they have many friends who wish them happiness on their golden wedding day, and many more happy years.

Tonight at 7:30 o'clock, a mock wedding is to be performed. Their son-in-law, Espejo James, will act as minister instead of the Rev. C. W. Crall who officiated in 1873.

Doreene De Silva Is Held Guilty

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 22 (AP)—Doreene De Silva was convicted of manslaughter last night by the jury which tried her for shooting to death Gilbert Pinto on the inner Malin Nov. 8. The jury recommended leniency. Sentence will be pronounced Monday. One to fifteen years imprisonment is the penalty for manslaughter.
