15, it is announced.

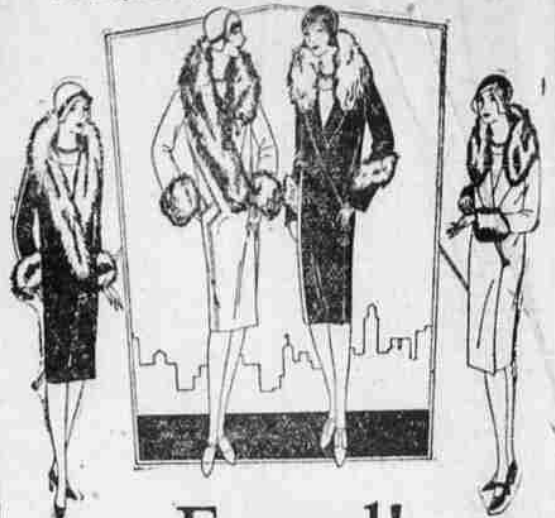
A large attendance is anticipated
