Violent Storm, Floods Sweep Over Belgium

BRUSSELS, Belgium, Dec. 28 (AP)—Nearly 7,000 acres of land and five villages near Termonde were under water today. Floods, pushed along by a violent gale and augmented by the waters of the tide rushing inland swept over a section of the lowlands. Greater destruction than occurred four weeks ago was threatened.

Just as a month ago the new floods came suddenly and without warning. High winds pushed far inland the waters of the swollen Scheldt which met an exceptionally high tide.

Much suffering and damage have resulted already and losses greater than those of a month ago repeat, rest.

500 LIVES LOST.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (AP)—Loss of 500 lives and 20 vessels, and a threat of destitution and famine in six provinces of the Philippine Islands were detailed in the first reports on the recent typhoon, received here today by the American Red Cross from Governor General Henry L. Stimson.

A relief fund of \$20,000 has been forwarded from Washington to the Manila Red Cross chapter and cable reports stated that a Christmas relief ship carrying emergency workers and seed for quick growing crops to prevent famine had sailed from Manila.

Hit-Run Driver Kills Pioneer, 73

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 28 (AP)—No trace of a hit-and-run driver who killed Hogan A. Arntsen, 73, Utah pioneer, at a downtown intersection last night had been found today.

A few minutes after Arntsen was struck down by the unidentified driver who fled the scene of the accident, State Auditor John E. Holden, drove his car over the victim's body. Holden declared he did not see the body until his car passed over it. Holden was questioned by police and then released. Arntsen was instantly killed, physicians believe.

County Attorney Wallace B. Kelly announced that an inquest would be held this afternoon.
