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Local Churches To Observe New Year in Weekend

**Nazarene Zone Rally Set

The arrival of the New Year and the passing of 1928 will be observed in most of the La Grande churches Sunday and the following day. Several sermons on this subject are scheduled for delivery tomorrow and the Lutherans are planning a watch night program for New Year's eve. Old Flour Mill At Lostine To Be Remodeled

LOSTINE, Ore. (Special)—M. Crow has purchased the old flour mill which is located in the western part of town and is planning to open an up-to-date chicken farm. The building and grounds are ideal for a chicken farm, which will be run in the most modern fashion. The building, which is a three-story structure, will be remodeled, the basement, used for automobiles and furnace installed to keep the house at an even temperature during the winter season. Mr. Crow, who is a chicken fancier, will use one floor for a white chicken, a new breed that is called the Four Acres Six and the second floor will be used for Rhode Island Reds. About Feb. 1 Mr. Crow expects to receive 1,000 each of the white and red chicks and will have broilers to take care of the little ones. A man will be in charge of this new enterprise at all times and Mr. Crow expects to see this farm develop year after year until it will be one of the best chicken farms in Wallawa county. The property was purchased from the Black Marble and Lime company, of Estacada.

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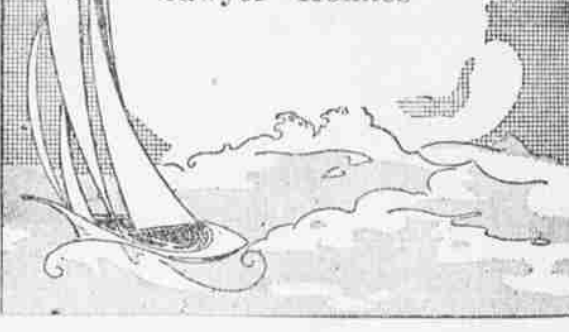

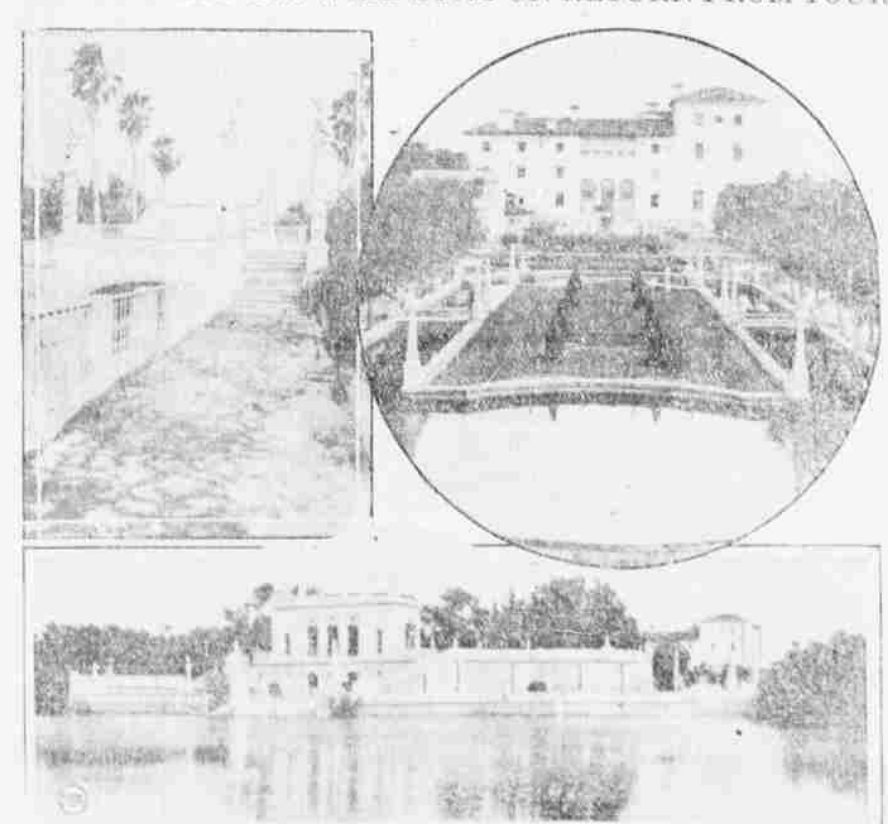
