POZZI, Italy, (AP)—A couple here, already the parents of nine children, have contributed to the Fascist campaign for more and better babies with nine triplets.

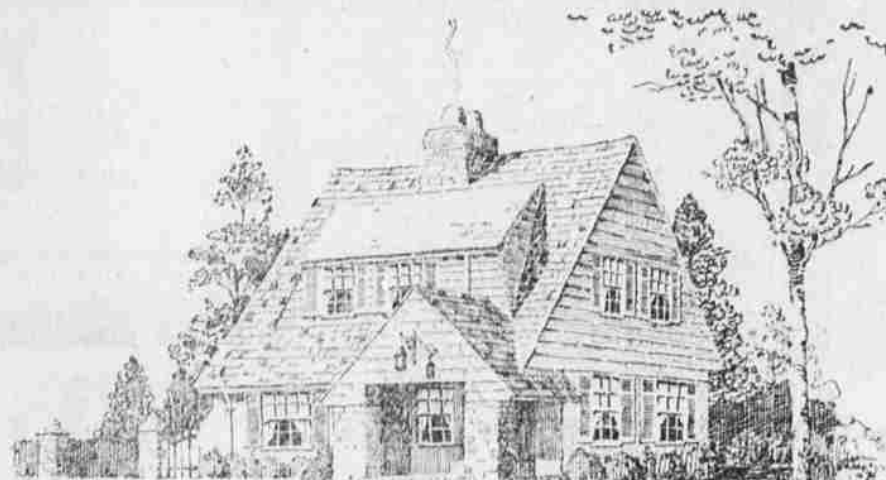

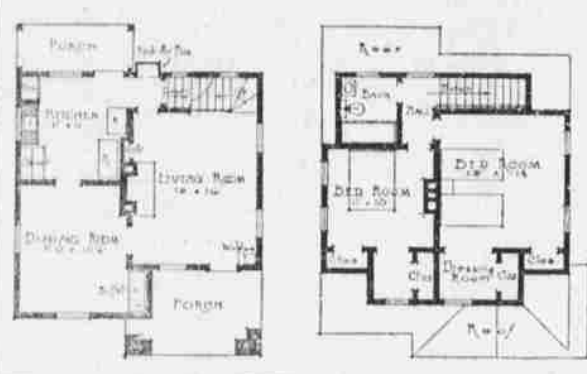

THINK HEAVY MEALS A DAY—2 BONE FORCE

THE CHILD

The worry and anxiety on the part of parents about a feeding problem in a child is quite natural, because lack of a desire for food generally is associated in their own lives with physical illness. They have been taught that each and every child should receive three hearty meals a day, and most recently that every meal should contain exactly as many calories of fat, sugar and proteins. The importance of weight and height, and child standardization of these physical factors, have perhaps been over-emphasized. With extreme emotional concern about feeding the child, therefore, they often resort to methods of meeting the difficulty that tend to exaggerate and to perpetuate the very problem they are trying to solve.

The first and most important step in overcoming a feeding difficulty is to have the child carefully examined so as to eliminate all physical causes. After this step has been carried out, one can use the following procedure with confidence of success: When there is no evidence of physical disease, the physician generally finds that it is not the amount of food the child has taken into his system (and in the real problem, but rather the way he takes it, the time he takes it and the kind of food he takes).

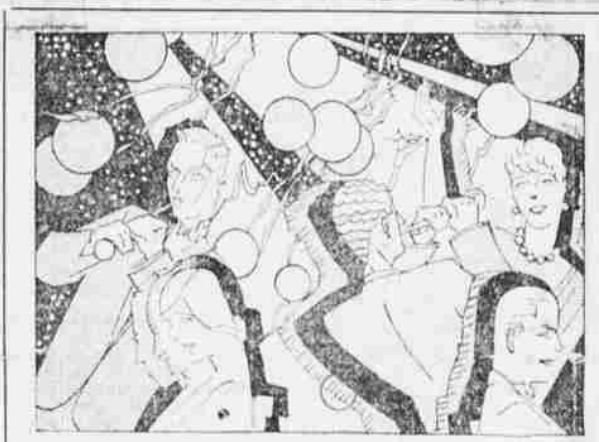
