Wrestler Loses Match When He Slugs Opponent

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 3 (AP)—Tom Alley, Montana light heavy-weight wrestler, temporarily lost his head in his match with Bob Meyers, ex-national amateur champion in the welterweight class, and lost to Meyers when he deliberately slugged Meyers after each had won a fall here last night. Meyers took the first fall in 43 minutes, 26 seconds when he dumped Alley to the mat with a partial airplane split. Alley was knocked groggy and it was no trick to pin him down. The second fall went to Alley when Meyers again tried an airplane split. After being hoisted in the air, Alley crawled down Meyers' back, grabbed him by both ankles and finally secured a combination step-over and crab hold. The time for the fall was 17 minutes and 10 seconds. The third episode had gone 12 minutes and 10 seconds when the foul occurred.

Chief Wiles, Portland traffic cop, won from Ray Castle, Salt Lake, taking the one fall necessary in 22 minutes, in the preliminary.

Bill Cissell To Get Lessons In Punch Slugging

CHICAGO, Jan. 3 (AP)—Manager "Lena" Blackburn plans to get a bumper crop of base hits and sparkling field plays from the "123,000 White Sox Peach" Bill Cissell next season.

Cissell, obtained from Portland last winter for \$125,000, failed to hit and field for that amount of money during the 1928 campaign, but "Lena" still insists he is a "find" and intends to prove it.

Blackburn intends to revolutionize Cissell's hitting and fielding. He plans to make a "punch hitter" out of him instead of letting him take a full swing and to teach him to wait for the bounce instead of "striking" the ball. "Just swing and see the difference," Lena said. "Cissell is going to be one of the greatest baseball players yet. He is a natural."

Golf Association To Meet Saturday

NEW YORK, Jan. 3 (AP)—Eighty delegates, including many of the most notable figures in golf, are expected to attend the annual meeting of the United States Golf Association here Saturday. Bobby Jones already has notified Secretary Prescott S. Bush that he will be present. Melvin A. Traynor, president of the association, and Vice Presidents Herbert H. Ramsay and Findlay S. Douglas, will be present along with many of the officers and leaders of sectional associations.

Previous to the regular meeting at which officers for the coming year will be elected, the special session committee will meet. These sessions, the first tomorrow morning, will be devoted to discussion of the problems of the greenkeepers.

Herrick, Former Millionaire, Is Held Bankrupt

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 3 (AP)—The Spokane-Review says today that an involuntarily petition in bankruptcy will be filed Thursday or Friday against Fred Herrick, former millionaire lumber operator. Herrick recently assigned all his properties to his creditors, to whom he was said to owe between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000.

According to the Spokane-Review a business board appointed by the creditors had been hopeful of keeping settlement of the lumberman's tangled financial affairs out of bankruptcy court, but were unable to do so when three banks refused to release preferred claims secured when the Fred Herrick lumber company of Oregon was sold.

The three banks together with the amount of their preferred claims were: the Exchange National bank, Spokane \$45,000; First National bank of Chicago \$125,000 and the Baker-Fentris bank of Chicago \$151,000.

Other creditors of Herrick said that they resented the efforts of these banks to secure such large blocks of cash, and would prefer that all creditors share alike when Herrick's affairs became such that a pro-rata distribution could be effected without preference.

32,000 Men Wait At Ford Plant For Employment

DETROIT, Jan. 3 (AP)—Milling about the employment office of the Ford Motor Company at Fordson, crowd estimated by officials of the company at 32,000 men responded to the announcement of a company that 30,000 additional men will be employed.

The crowd was unwieldy and the employment office, which was to have opened at 8 a. m., remained closed until guards could lead the men into a semicircle at a line.

Many of those outside the small building had stood all night in the snow. By 4 a. m. the number was estimated at 3,000 and by 5 a. m. Ford officials said there were 32,000 on hand.

Employment officials of the company have announced that from 500 to 600 men will be added to the plant's roster daily until the full complement of 30,000 has been added. More than that cannot be hired daily, they said, because of the details of employing. The initial announcement of the company said the 20,000 men will have been hired by March 1 to enable the operation of the plant six days a week while maintaining the Ford schedule of a five day week for employees.
