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### DRIVE AGAINST WOMEN ATHLETES

#### Division of N. A. A. F. Opposes Participation in 1932 Olympic Games

NEW YORK, Jan. 4 (AP)—Opposition expressed by the women's division of the National Amateur Athletic Federation to participation by women in the 1932 Olympic games will not prevent that part of the program from being carried out in full according to Olympic and A. A. F. leaders.

Addressing the fifth annual meeting of the women's division yesterday, Ethel Perrin, chairman of the division's executive committee reported that her committee had endorsed the launching of a campaign to educate girls in schools and colleges and other girls of school and college age not to train for competition in the next Olympic games to be held in Los Angeles.

**Expect No Effect**  
Most Olympic and A. A. F. officials thought the women's organization's opposition would have no effect on the program.

"I do not think it will have any effect in the least," said Gustavus T. Kirby, past president of the American Olympic committee. "There are tens of thousands of girls who demand the right of competition and they are going to get it."

The matter was discussed very carefully by the International Amateur Athletic Federation at Amsterdam. Some thought that the event were beset by too strenuous but statistics show that the competition of girls and women had no bad effect, with the consideration to their condition at the time.

"Tennis and golf are approved of. What about Olympic fencing; that's all right they say, yet they have to strain just as much as if they were in a dash, high jump or other event."

**Generally Recognized**  
Murray Hulbert, president last year of the A. A. U., and American representative on the International Amateur Athletic Federation, pointed out that participation of women in athletics is recognized by all international sports governing bodies.

"To what extent women participate," he said, "depends upon the women themselves. Of course they are limited to certain events and must pass a physical examination. It was on my motion that the 500-meter run was eliminated from the 1922 Olympic program for women."

Frederick W. Hubben, who was secretary of the American Olympic committee during the last games, and Daniel J. Ferris, secretary-treasurer of the National A. A. U., both say they believed the organization's opposition would have no effect.

"This is a reiteration of what we have said before," Ferris declared. "They did not give us any assistance in the past and perhaps we can't expect it this year. They have no control over anybody. The United States will be represented as it always is."

**REFEREE IN HURT**  
NEW YORK, Jan. 4 (AP)—Cooper Smeaton, chief referee of the National Hockey League, is the most recent casualty of the rough ice game. It was learned today that he had broken the fibula of his left leg in a tangle with a group of players while officiating the game between the New York Americans and the Montreal Canadiens last Tuesday.

### DEMPSEY LEAVES WRITERS GROGGY

#### May Fight Again He Says —Figures George Godfrey is Best Heavy

MACON, Ga., Jan. 4 (AP)—En route to Miami Florida to talk it over with Tex Rickard, Jack Dempsey is issuing a one man census of the heavyweight situation, and as interpreted by his interviewers along the line, it runs something like this:

"The winner of the Scribbling-Sharkey fight at Miami Beach February 27, will be the next champion of the world."

"I am willing to meet the winner of the Scribbling-Sharkey fight, but will have no announcements to make until I see Rickard."

"I'm not sure yet that I want to box again."

"I will not referee the Miami Beach fight."

"I believe George Godfrey, the negro, is the best among the crop of heavyweights just at present."

**WRITERS GROGGY**  
These contributions to fight bal-lyhood left the scribes in cities through which the former champion has passed in the last 24 hours dazed and somewhat groggy. The going will ring on the next round of the scribbler's battle with Dempsey at Miami Beach tonight and it appears that Dempsey's mighty right has been bolstered with rhetoric that will carry a knockout punch.

His last official contribution was made last night when he passed through Macon. Young Scribbling, back from Kansas City and a New Year's day bout, had just arrived and was at the station when the Dixie flyer came through with Dempsey aboard.

"Hi, Scrib," was Dempsey's greeting to the young Georgian whom he has never seen in action.

Dempsey said he was in a hurry to reach Miami, where Rickard is ill after an appendicitis operation, and Young Scribbling, a licensed pilot, offered to fly him down.

"No, I'd better go on," Jack replied, "but I would have been glad to have stayed over with you for a while if Rickard had not been ill. Thanks for your offer and for coming down to the train."

**Dempsey Not Sure**  
To interviewers the mauler said he was not sure yet whether he wanted to box again, and voiced the opinion that he thought the winner of the Scribbling-Sharkey set-to would be the next champion.

At Atlanta earlier in the evening, Dempsey said he would not referee the Miami Beach encounter as had been planned by Rickard, but would not be drawn out.

"Sharkey's a good fighter," he told sports writers who asked his opinion as to the Miami Beach fight "but I haven't seen Scribbling work. I understand however, that he has got a powerful sock in that right hand now, and has improved a lot in many ways."

### Edvin Wide Here To Study System
