Professor Horner Recalls Early Days

nets. Yes, the girls were so pretty that my mother often feared lest they would turn my brain.
The families of that community as I recall them from memory were the Blocklands, Booths, Cavinesses, Combes, Dunbars, Dunbars, Feeles, Feeles, Neskeys, Gibbans, Gonds, Grinnatts, Hughes, Halloys, Holmans, Hunters, Jones, Kelloggs, Kellogs, Wails.

When you read this long list of names from a sparsely settled neighborhood you may wonder how one could remember them throughout a half century. But could you have known these people as I know them you would wonder more how it could be possible to forget any of them. I may have overlooked some of them in the list but I can never forget them.

Genealogy, Noble People
I worked for many of these people, and every blood with some of them long enough to observe their habits. As I grew older so I could compare them better with others, it occurred to me that within the entire range of my acquaintance I never found a people more genuine and noble—a people who in their modest way could face difficulties encountered by pioneers more masterfully than these. And I have felt that the influence of their lives left a sweet fragrance upon mine. Thus I regard my boyhood spent under the shadow of "Sakach Seminary."

Back of the school building boys played knucks. John McAllister afterwards representative of Union county, was champion of the game. Often the young folks played "Chase the Fox." They fell into line. The leader ran over the following meaningless but musical doggerel.

"Till-ry G-ry lck-er-y Ann,
"Till-is-in phat-er-son, Nich-o-las John,
"Quevy, Quavy, English navy,
"Stink-lum, stank-lum, shoe leather duck."
When the last word fell to some one who ran like a jack-rabbit over the unfenced sagebrush prairie. The one who caught him held honors and in turn was chased by the others.

The Spelling School
The evening spelling school was one of the leading events of those times. Captains chose sides, and the teachers gave out the words from Webster's speller. At the first spelling match that I attended in this community, Mr. James McCall was teacher, Miss Sarah Surber, my classmate, won the prize for being the best speller, and afterwards the fortunate teacher won the hand of the fair young lady. Young folks these days do not know what they have missed because of the passing of the old-time spelling school.

Freighting with ox-team was common in those days; and the best ox driver I ever knew was Albert Good. He seemed to educate his team so that every ox knew just what he was to do. On the other hand many drivers used "PNT" language excessively and were cruel with the whip to the oxen that could never learn the refined speech of Shakespeare. Billy Wellman could handle the six ribs of the stage better than any man on the road. In those days the arrival of the stage in Oro Dell signified more to us than the arrival of a train in La Grande does nowadays.

One of the memorable sights was "Uncle Joe Jones" walking from his farm in the neighborhood on a Monday morning to Oro Dell where he practiced blacksmithing.
