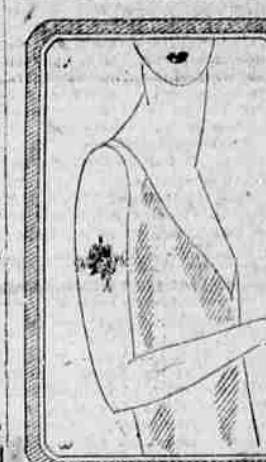

"This is a notebook of large proportions. The divisions of it read 'gags for dinner,' 'gags for the theater,' 'gags for the kitchen' and so on through every possible place something can happen."

"Then under each caption is a list of sure fire gags which have been used often enough to always get laughs. For instance under 'kitchen gags' would appear such notations as: Use salt instead of sugar, drop something in the cake, fall face first onto a newly frosted cake, drop soap into the creamed fish, dip a chicken's foot into hot water, taste something and show disgust. You can carry that on forever. I once knew a 'gagman' who had a book of 14,000 gags. One day he lost it and had to become an extra until he could recollect the book."

"You don't get much originality this way and for that reason the gag book is no longer allowed on the sets of feature length comedies. Newness and originality are the demands of comedy now and we must work out all of our gags fresh on the set. Suggestions are discarded when anyone recalls having seen the gag or one similar in another comedy. That's why I feel that 'The Night Bird' is my best vehicle."

## Milling Sound, P. H. Lawson, Of Kansas, Declares

KANSAS CITY (AP)—January 1, 1928, found the milling industry entering the last six months of its fiscal year in an unsatisfactory condition. It closed the year June 1 with a small profit, having operated on a very unsatisfactory crop of wheat.

With the coming of the 1928 crop flour milling conditions have changed. The wheat producer's good extraction of an excellent baking flour. There is a definite trend toward better trade conditions and an effort to eliminate some of the trade evils such as milling for volume, the sale of a portion of the output below operating expenses, price cutting and unethical terms.

There has been a reduction in the operating capacity by the closing down of inefficiently operated plants in favor of the modern mill that can produce flour at a minimum of operating cost.

The winter wheat crop, now in the ground, is in the most favorable condition. With the good milling wheat available for the first six months of 1929, followed with the harvest that is now indicated, the year should be a very satisfactory one.

Our business is fundamentally sound. In the past satisfactory returns have been made on milling investments, and I have no doubt the future will also show satisfactory returns.
