INCREASE IN
SCHOOL TAX
IS APPROVEDBoth Measures Pass at
Annual Election Held
Here YesterdayVOTE LIGHT; ONLY
191 VISIT POLLSSix Per Cent Measure
Wins 81 to 66 and 1929
Budget Is Adopted By
85 to 62 vote

Both measures presented to qualified voters of school district No. 1, which includes La Grande, were passed at the annual election yesterday but by a small margin.

The vote was very light, with only 191 ballots being marked in Greenwood and Central grade schools, where the polls were open from 2 to 7 o'clock.

One measure provided for the levying of a tax six per cent in excess of the tax levied last year. This was made necessary by the high school fire, which created an emergency that required an additional \$15,000 besides the amount in the budget drawn up before the fire.

The vote on the six per cent tax limitation measure was yes 81, no 66. At Central school there were 65 affirmative and 52 negative votes. At Greenwood school the vote was 18 yes, 14 no.

The other measure, for the adoption of the budget for 1929, was approved 85 to 62, a margin of 23, slightly more than the margin in favor of the first measure. The vote at Central school was 87 yes, 50 no, and at Greenwood 18 voted yes and 12 no, according to H. E. Williams, clerk of the district.

The La Grande High school basketball team has two games scheduled for this weekend. Friday night the men will play the Joseph High school team in La Grande. The game will start at 7:30 o'clock. Joseph is said to have a small fast team this year.

HUGE PLANE
SUCCEEDS IN
TEST FLIGHTTwenty-passenger Cabin
Craft Is of An Unusual
ConstructionJOURNEY ACROSS
NATION PLANNEDPlane Was Designed to
Minimize Drag of Fuse-
lage; Has Capacity of
1,000 Gallons Gas

NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 9 (AP)—The largest airplane ever built in this country, a 20-passenger cabin plane of unusual construction, today had vindicated the theories of its 34-year-old designer.

The plane made four test flights yesterday, one carrying 15 passengers, and after another week of tests, it is planned to fly the mail, to Washington, and then across the continent to San Francisco.

The designer is Vincent J. Burnelli who planned the craft to minimize the drag of the fuselage. The body is 12 feet wide and has its two motors set side by side in the nose and fully enclosed. The contour of the fuselage is streamlined, as also is the wing section, to convert the usual drag unit into an airfoil with considerable lifting qualities.

Construction of the plane was financed by Paul W. Chapman, New York and Chicago financier. It is planned to put it in passenger service as the first of a fleet of 24 or more.

The plane has a fuel capacity of 1,000 gallons and can make 2,400 miles at a cruising speed of 115 miles an hour. It has a wing span of 90 feet and is 47 feet long. It is of all metal construction.

The cabin interior is luxuriously furnished, including running water, kitchen and steward service. There are 12 upholstered swivel chairs before the windows and two centre lounges. The walls of the cabin are soundproof to lessen the din of the exhaust.

On its test flight yesterday, the plane was operated by Lieut. Wade, one of the pilots on the army round-the-world flight of 1924, who now is a test pilot for Skylines, owners of the plane.

Hoover Again Guest at White House;

Confers With Brookhart, of Iowa

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—President-Elect Hoover called at the white house today for a second general discussion with President Coolidge of the various problems facing the present and next administration.

Mr. Hoover has spent two days developing the views of congressional leaders as to an extra session of congress for farm relief and other subjects and it was assumed that these matters formed the chief basis of his conversation with the chief executive.

Talks With Brookhart
Before going to the white house the next president had a long conference with Senator Brookhart of Iowa, a republican independent, who was one of his chief campaign-ers in the corn belt and who favors the calling of an extra session early in the spring.

Another early caller at the temporary headquarters of the president-elect was Senator Jones of Washington, republican whip in the senate, who remained only a few minutes and who said he merely had called to pay his respects.

Challenge All
Women on Jury,
Northcott CaseAction By Prosecution
Leaves Only Men in
Box; Asa Keyes Jury Is
Finally Selected

COURTROOM, Riverside, Cal., Jan. 9 (AP)—The state exercised its right of peremptory challenge today to place the tentative jury in the trial of Gordon Stewart Northcott back on the original all-men basis.

Mrs. Mildred Breese, a housekeeper, the only woman left seated in the box at the close of yesterday's court session, was excused and a man called in her place. The prosecuting attorneys previously had stated that because of the nature of the evidence they preferred to have no women on the jury.

KEYES JURY PICKED
LOS ANGELES, Jan. 9 (AP)—A jury of ten women and two men was agreed upon by defense and prosecution in the third day of legal maneuvering to try former District Attorney Asa Keyes and five co-defendants on bribery and conspiracy charges.

Keyes, the outstanding figure of the trial, enters it bearing the scars of many legal battles in a court room where he has prosecuted hundreds of persons as the climax of a law enforcement career of more than a quarter of a century. He is charged with conspiring with and accepting bribes to prevent prosecution of the other principals following the crash of the Julian Petroleum company.

Salvation Army
Reformist Party
Has Upper Hand

SUNBURY-ON-THAMES, Eng., Jan. 9 (AP)—The reformist party in the Salvation Army high council, headed by Evangeline Booth, American commander, was undecided this afternoon to have 53 members on its side against 39 non-reformists headed by Mrs. Bramwell Booth, wife of the general, and Catherine Booth, his daughter.

It was said that the election of Commissioner James Hay of New Zealand yesterday as president of the council was carried on the lines of this division.

It also said that Edward Higgins, chief of staff, who has been regarded as one of the supporters of General Booth, has ranged himself at the side of the reformists.

10,000 Pay Tribute
To Rickard Today

NEW YORK, Jan. 9 (AP)—With fully 10,000 persons silently looking on in the vast, sombre-draped arena, the world of sports paid its first tribute to Tex Rickard today at the funeral services in Madison Square garden.

The services were begun at 2 p. m. by the Rev. Caleb Moore, pastor of the Madison Avenue Baptist church, an hour after all doors had been closed to the general public by the police and admittance restricted only to those bearing special cards.

JENNY DOLLY ILL

PARIS, Jan. 9 (AP)—Jenny Dolly, one of the American Dolly sister dancing pairs, has been passing safely through the crisis of an appendicitis attack and an operation which had been planned, has been postponed until she is thoroughly recovered, probably within a few weeks.

FAMOUS ATTORNEY DIES

CHICAGO, Jan. 9 (AP)—Arthur B. Mulvey, believed to have defended more friendly persons in federal court here than any other attorney and who rarely accepted a fee, dropped dead yesterday at the age of 55 years.

94 Flu Deaths In
Portland in Month

PORTLAND, Jan. 9 (AP)—Ninety-four deaths in Portland during December are directly charged to influenza by the city health bureau in its formal report today. Thirty-six of them were due primarily to influenza, and 58 to complicating forms of pneumonia. The death total from all causes during the month was 426, which is said to be far above the average, while the birth total of 325 is far below.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—Large increases in influenza reported in southern states sent the total for the country at large up to 195,552 new cases for the week ending January 5, reports to the public health service showed today, compared with 162,288 cases reported the preceding week.

Four Killed When
Trains Collide

ASHFORTH, Gloucestershire, Jan. 9 (AP)—Four persons, including the engineer, were killed and a number of others injured when an express passenger train travelling 50 miles an hour crashed head-on into a freight train in the fog last night. The engine of the express overturned and a number of coaches were smashed.

The wreck occurred about 29 miles from Chalford, where 15 persons were killed in a train wreck last October.

DEBATING OF
TREATY YET
IN PROGRESSSenator Blaine Makes A
Plea for Adoption of
His ResolutionREED WILL TAKE
FLOOR SHORTLYWisconsin Law - maker
Fears Anti-war Plan
May Turn Into Menace
to Civilization

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—The Kellogg anti-war treaty went into another round of senate debate today with Senator Blaine, republican, Wisconsin, making a plea for adoption of his resolution to declare it the sense of the senate that Great Britain's note reserving freedom of action under the treaty in defense of her territories should not be considered in actual reservation to the treaty.

Senator Reed, democrat of Missouri, who has withheld his attack pending the outcome of a conference looking to an agreement in the controversy over preparation of an American interpretation was ready to take the floor late today or tomorrow.

By acceptance of the British views, expressed in a note by Foreign Minister Chamberlain, Senator Blaine argued that "we by this treaty solemnly acknowledge that less than 10,000,000 subjects of Great Britain shall have the right to rule over 400,000,000 people, without their consent or against their protest."

"Is there a single member of this senate," he asked, "who can say that we are not by this treaty building up a power that is not only a menace to the peace of the world but, as well, a menace to civilization itself."

"This pact commits our nation to an impossible peace whereby the traditions of America and forgetful of that which made this republic possible."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—A bitter attack on William Randolph Hearst was made in the senate today by Senator Heflin, democrat, Alabama, who declared that the celebrated Mexican documents at the last session should "indict" the publisher before it was discharged.

He Escapes
Four-Story Dive
But Not Wives

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 9 (AP)—When Ralph E. Hendrick escaped with a broken ankle in a four-story dive from an office building, he didn't mind the "nice pieces" which appeared in papers.

But now that two women are at his bedside with bigamy charges, Hendrick is finding it difficult to smile.

After police women quoted him as admitting bigamy yesterday, Hendrick hastened to correct that statement today. The structural steel worker said he was married only to Ruth Inez Hendrick, 13-year-old Tazewell, Tenn., school girl. That's his story, and he intends to stick to it, despite Mrs. Jean Hendrick, who positively identified the man as her husband.

PHOENICIANS
IN NEW WORLD
IN 2,000 B. C.

RIO JANEIRO, Jan. 9 (AP)—The newspaper A Noite today quoted Alfredo do Ranjao, a Portuguese naturalist, as saying that he had found evidence that Egyptian, Phoenician and Carthaginian civilizations existed in Brazil and other parts of South America 4,000 years ago. He has just returned to Rio Janeiro after spending four months in the little known interior regions.

The naturalist said he had verified hieroglyphics reported by a French engineer years ago in Minas Goyaz, Matto Grosso, and Bahia. More than 3,000 were found and some were photographed. He claimed that these indicated that ancient peoples took their treasures to Brazil and founded cities there.

Soviet Documents
Declared False

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—Documents purporting to show payments of \$100,000 each to Senators Borah, of Idaho, and Norris, of Nebraska, by the Soviet government for their services to Russia have been declared false by a senate committee, which investigated them.

When informed of the existence of the papers, Senators Borah and Norris went before the committee in secret session and insisted upon being sworn and then denied everything contained in the papers.

ENTIRE NATION
PRAISES FLIERSCrew of Question Mark
Receive Congratulations
and Invitations

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 9 (AP)—The entire nation today was paying homage to the five army corps men who flew the Question Mark on the world's longest sustained flight. The mass of congratulatory telegrams still pouring in to the members of the crew included urgent invitations for the Question Mark, its crew and its rescuing crews to visit practically every city in the United States for exhibition of the plane and fitting civic welcomes to the fliers. All messages were being referred to the war department.

After two nights sleep in comfortable beds, with all the conveniences of modern civilization at their hands again, the five heroes, four officers and a sergeant today had faced the first of what they described as the "hardest part" of the whole remarkable flight—and that was the round of public receptions and speech-making. They had taken the first plunge with a radio address yesterday afternoon broadcasting their impressions and analysis of the flight over a national radio hook-up and there was more to come.

Early details for the entertainment and public functions for the fliers—Major Carl Spatz, Captain Ira Eaker, Lieut. Harry Halverston, Lieut. Elwood Quenda, and Sergeant Roy Hoos, had not been completed, but plans call for the full crew to fly the Question Mark to Rockwell Field, San Diego this week, after the minor repairs to the motors had been completed yesterday and then to await orders from the war department to fly the famous plane to Washington.

Rare Books Bring
Total of \$273,952

NEW YORK, Jan. 9 (AP)—The auction of rare books for a total value of \$273,952 at the Anderson galleries last night was believed by bookshelves to have established a record for a single session of a book sale in this country.

The collection was the property of Jerome Kern, composer, and the greater part of the money was paid for 118 Dickens items.

Bite Sends Indian
To Penitentiary

SIBBETON, S. D., Jan. 9 (AP)—Anno White, Sioux Indian, who bit off the end of his wife's nose so she would be less attractive to other Indian men, was sentenced to two years and eight months in the state penitentiary at Sioux Falls by Judge Babcock in circuit court here last night. He was charged with maiming.

Heir to Millions
Accident Victim

ORLANDO, Fla., Jan. 9 (AP)—Van C. McCrory, son and sole heir to the millions of John C. McCrory, chain store operator, was accidentally killed by one of his closest friends during a deer hunt yesterday.

Haynes F. Maguire, Orlando attorney, and a relative by marriage, shot the 22-year-old vice president of the McCrory chain while the two were traveling horseback through the 10,000 acre McCrory estate in Orange county.

Smiling Gunmen
Blast Life Of
Uncrowned KingPasqualino Lolardo's Chi-
cago House Scene of
Killing; Linked With
Lombardo Death

CHICAGO, Jan. 9 (AP)—At Pasqualino Lolardo's house late yesterday three smiling men raised glasses to drink the health of their host, then they shot him dead. Eleven bullets from automatic pistols drilled into the head, neck and shoulder of Lolardo. When he fell, the fingers of his right hand still clutched the stem of a wine glass, shattered by the shots.

Lolardo's assassination was a sequel, as are all Chicago gang and Mafia slayings, but whether it was a sequel to the murder of Tony Lombardo last fall, to black-hand operations of recent months, or to some unexplained gang hatred, police were not prepared to say.

The ywere looking, however, for Joe Aiello, eldest of seven brothers whose participation in gang violence has come under police scrutiny several times in the past. John Stego, deputy police commissioner, said he had a witness who identified Aiello as one of the three men in the room when Lolardo was slain.

Second Shooting
Detectives were still at the Lolardo flat, questioning Lolardo's grief-stricken widow, when another gang shooting left Rocco Maggio, severely wounded in his parked automobile. Maggio, once convicted of murder, was shot in the head by men who fired shotguns from their automobile as it sped by Maggio's home.

The guns then removed Tony Lombardo from gang power four months ago in a downtown street shooting, echoed in the Lolardo flat yesterday, for it was Lolardo's brother, Joe, who walked at Lombardo's side when that leader among Italians fell. Police believe the two assassinations were connected, but in what manner they could not say. There was even one report that Joe Lolardo was in the room when his brother was slain.

Must Have 1929
License Plates,
Beginning Today

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 9 (AP)—Beginning today, motor vehicle drivers whose cars are not equipped with 1929 license plates are subject to arrest, says a statement issued yesterday by Hal E. Hom, secretary of state. Traffic officers in all parts of the state were instructed by Hom yesterday to begin checking up on the licenses today.

The congestion of applications for new plates has now been eliminated and Hom said that from now on the new plates will be mailed to car owners within 24 hours after applications are received. Approximately 75,000 sets of plates have been delivered so far this year.

Two distributing offices are being maintained in Portland to expedite the work.

PORTLAND, Jan. 9 (AP)—Although the edict of Hal E. Hom, secretary of state, calls for arrest of drivers of automobiles still adorned with 1928 licenses today, local police activity in that direction will not begin until tomorrow.

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AIR LINE TO
WEST INDIES
INAUGURATEDFirst Planes Hop Off Car-
rying Both Passengers
And Mail

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 9 (AP)—America's air line to the West Indies linking five nations with this country was inaugurated here today with the departure of four mail-passenger planes of the Pan-American Air-Ways for Havana, Porto Rico and the Bahamas.

They bore an array of distinguished passengers, including Postmaster General Harry S. New, William P. McCracken, assistant secretary of commerce for aviation, and Miss Amelia Earhart, transatlantic flier.

Starts for Havana
Preceded by ceremonies which included playing of the American, Cuban, Porto Rican, Dominican and British national airs, the first ship took off for Havana at 8:07 a. m. It carried 16 sacks of mail and four passengers, among whom were Mr. McCracken and Miss Earhart.

A second Havana plane, carrying more mail and one passenger, took away 16 minutes later.

The postmaster general himself loaded the mail on the Porto Rico plane, then climbed aboard and departed with it at 8:11. He intended to disembark at Havana, the first stop, and return here by plane during the afternoon.

HEADS FOR U. S.
SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Jan. 9 (AP)—The first airplane from Porto Rico to the United States was started promptly at 8 o'clock this morning by the Pan-American Air-Ways. Governor Towler dropped the starting flag while a band played national airs of the countries which the plane will touch.SCHOOLS COST
\$22,000,000 IN
STATE IN YEAR

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 9 (AP)—For the fiscal year ending June 18 last, the public schools of Oregon expended \$22,000,000, says the biennial report of C. A. Howard, state superintendent of schools. The enrollment of pupils in the schools totals about 187,000 and about 8,000 teachers are employed. Clerks and school board members in the state number 3,624.

In buildings, grounds and equipment the schools represent an investment of \$40,000,000 says the report.

John Coolidge Is
Now C. M. T. C. Major

HARTFORD, Conn., Jan. 9 (AP)—Major John Coolidge tonight will escort his fiancée, Miss Florence Trumbull, to her father's inaugural ball. It will be the first time the major has worn his new uniform.

Appointment of the president's son as a major on the staff of Governor John H. Trumbull was made possible by an agreement of the general assembly to amend the military law of the state today to permit appointment of a staff officer to represent the citizen military training camps.

Peasants Rebel
In Namoru, Japan

TOKYO, Jan. 9 (AP)—Three companies of regular infantry were rushed to Namoru, a village near Gifu, today when Japan's smouldering rural unrest flared up momentarily.

Two thousand peasants marched in a body on the local government office and 200 police were unable to control them. Fighting ensued with casualties on both sides and the troops were called.
