This is considered the most delightful part of the voyage and is a sight to behold for 200 miles with both sides constantly in sight, strewn with islands of all shapes from small and uninhabited rocks to wave encrusted and cultivated to their very summits," she said.

"I hope that someday all of you will be able to visit these countries and see for yourselves what I have so feebly attempted to describe," Mrs. Baker concluded.

MENUS

BREAKFAST—Stewed dried peaches, corned cream, liver paties with crisp broiled bacon, bran and raisin muffins, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Stuffed green peppers, lettuce rolls, cranberry whip, coconut cookies, milk, tea.
DINNER—Plank steak en caserole, sweet potato balls, curly oysters with bacon dressing, deep dish apple pie, milk, coffee.
 Green peppers are delicious stuffed with a combination of rice and sardines. Lemon juice and a mere suspicion of onion juice worked into the fish gives an intriguing flavor to the dish.
Cranberry Whip
 Two cups cranberries, 1/2 cup water, 1 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon granulated gelatin, 4 tablespoons cold water, 2 whites of eggs.
 Put cranberries and water into sauce pan and cook until berries burst open. Add sugar and let stand until sugar is dissolved. Rub through a fine sieve. Bring to the boiling point and add gelatin softened in cold water. Stir until dissolved and let stand until cool and beginning to jelly. Fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a mold and let stand until chilled and firm. Serve with custard sauce.
Custard Sauce
 One and one-half cups hot milk, 2 egg yolks, 4 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon flour, few grains salt, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.
 Mix and sift flour, salt and su-
