Tourist Tells Of Snowy Drive From Wyoming

A tourist who has just arrived in La Grande relates a story full of winter thrill. He tells of the past six days which were to him, to his wife and the occupants of the nine other automobiles which shared the experience, a "nightmare," and it was a surprise to him that they escaped without freezing to death, he says.

On the highway between Wamsutter, Wyo., and Ogden, Utah, the tourists in their automobiles encountered deep drifts of snow and wind which finally mounted to the proportions of a blizzard. They were six days getting through the drifts when under ordinary conditions the trip should have taken them but a day and a half, reports the tourist who did not give his name.

The state of Wyoming in that locality, at least, does not have a sufficient number of snow plows and shovels to keep the road clear, he says. They were not informed of the condition of the highway and when they found themselves in the midst of the drifts and the storm it was too late to turn back, he says.

The caravan of ten cars found themselves bunched together, strung out one ahead of the other. They made their way slowly in the weather which the tourist says was below zero. Many times it was necessary to turn completely out of the road and drive the cars in detours through snow-covered sagebrush.

The persons in the cars working together dug the snow from the highway to make way for the cars. One car or a smaller group than ten could never have made it, he says.

SEATTLE, Jan. 9 (AP)—Two bandits were shot and fatally wounded and Thomas C. Carlo, president of the Barito company, was critically wounded in an attempt to hold up the company's office today. One of the bandits has been identified by police as Robert Byrne, 21.

Both men died at the city hospital shortly after the attempted holdup.

NIGHT LETTER SERVICE WILL BE EXTENDED

The Western Union Telegraph company announces that effective Jan. 14 its 50-word night letter service will be extended overseas to its offices in London, Liverpool, Birmingham, Bristol, Bradford, Manchester, Newcastle-on-Tyne, Southampton, Dundee, Edinburgh, Glasgow and Belfast. This cable night letter will supplement the weekend cable letter and the regular cable letter and is two cents per word cheaper than the latter. The new service will be extended to all points in Great Britain and Ireland as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made with the British authorities. It will do away with the expense incidental to coding and decoding messages and will provide the greater freedom of expression in cablegrams which plain language gives ac-

ording to word received here today.

"The extension of night letters overseas will mean much to the business man who makes frequent use of the cable as well as to those persons who use the cables for social messages," a bulletin issued by the company said.

Thinks Bullfights May Soon Disappear

EL PASO, Tex., Jan. 9 (AP)—The newspaper El Continental predicts today that bull fights will soon disappear in Mexico City because of the heavy taxes imposed on them by the government.

The new regulations impose a 25

per cent "cut" of the gross income as a tax to the federal government.

KILLED DAIRY FARMER, WIFE TO GET AUTO

CANTON, O., Jan. 9 (AP)—Edward Kallenbaugh, who has confessed the double murder of John Oser, Canal Fulton dairyman and his wife, Bertha, was returned here early today from Newcastle, Pa., where he was arrested at midnight and held in county jail for action by the grand jury.

Kallenbaugh has signed a confession to the double killing.

His arrest terminated a search extending fifty three miles, which has been under way since Oser was found in his dairy barn with a bullet in his head and his wife, in her night clothes, with her head bashed, Sunday morning by their six-year-old son, Harold.

In his confession, Kallenbaugh admitted that desire for the Oser automobile, a large sedan, prompted him last Saturday evening to take Oser's rifle from the kitchen

and slay the husband and wife.

"It came over me all of a sudden," he explained. "I wanted the automobile, so I shot Johnny. Then Mrs. Oser came out of the house and I shot her too."

A chance remark made by Oser a day or two before the fatal shooting, led directly to Kallenbaugh's arrest.
