## D. A. R. National, State Delegates Selected Here

Delegates to the state and national Daughters of American Revolution conventions to be held this year were elected at the local D. A. R. meeting held Wednesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Lynne Bohnekamp.

## MENUS

By Sister Mary  
BREAKFAST—Halves of grape fruit, cereal, cream, creamed finnan haddies on toast, milk, coffee.  
LUNCHEON—Scalloped sausage and apples, shredded carrots, baked in cream dressing, whole wheat bread, old-fashioned bread pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Boiled corned beef, brislet of beef, steamed potatoes, creamed turnips, banana and peanut salad, individual caramel custards, milk, coffee.

Cold boiled corned beef makes delicious sandwiches combined with salad dressing. The meat can be coarsely chopped and mixed with the dressing or thin slices of meat can be spread with salad dressing. Crisp lettuce can be added with good effect.

Scalloped Sausage and Apples.  
One pound link sausage, 4 apples, 1/2 cup dark brown sugar, 1/2 teaspoon thyme.

Pan broil sausages until brown on all sides. Arrange in a casserole and pour about 4 tablespoons boiling water over them. Cover with apples pared and cut in slices. Sprinkle apples with sugar and cinnamon. Cover casserole closely and bake in a slow oven for one hour. Serve from casserole. Choose tart quick cooking apples.
