(Continued from Page 1) had been depleted through illness. Between 10 and 12 per cent of the city's police force, railway workers, and street car and motor bus employees were on the sick list. Five to 10 per cent of the staffs of the larger department stores were absent from work. Motor ambulances were so over-worked that they were able to transport only the worst cases. It was thought that it might be necessary to use schools and other public buildings for temporary hospitals unless the epidemic abated soon. The city health department said, however, that the death rate had been comparatively low and professed not to be alarmed. Much Influenza After 10 days of severe frost there has been a serious outbreak of influenza in Glasgow, Scotland. Thousands have been taken ill and these included many public service workers. Zurich, Yugoslavia, reported many influenza victims and it was stated that the epidemic was widespread in the western part of that country. Desertrable has been visited by a violent snowstorm in which resulted in untold hardships among the peasants. Two peasants were found frozen to death in a field. Snow today covered most of England, Tramway, postal and police service was seriously affected. REED SCORES TREATY FOR WORLD PEACE (Continued from Page 1) the United States. In five hours time he declared, Great Britain could destroy the Panama Canal. "And in the negotiations for this treaty," Senator Reed shouted, striking the map with his pointer. "Great Britain reserved these as spheres of her interest in which she would not be bound by the treaty. This is what Great Britain says is not in the treaty and she reserves complete freedom of action. Reed Scores Pacifics "And the mollycoddles of this country say we shall sit quiet and not protect the Monroe Doctrine on some South American country with the treaty." If this country is ever destroyed, Reed declared, it will be done by the pacifists who "go around about shouting 'peace, peace, peace, when there is no peace of the kind they are talking about.' IMPRESSION OF THEFT WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP)—Chairman Reed of the special senate committee which investigated the Russian and Mexican fraudulent documents told the senate today he had a "vague impression" that papers stolen from the American embassy in Mexico and which came to the committee's attention had been stolen by a disloyal stenographer in the embassy. PROFIT INCREASE APPROVED WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP)—An increase of \$25,000,000 in the fund for prohibition enforcement was approved today by the senate appropriations committee.
