Wheat Unsettled And Lower Today

CHICAGO, Jan. 11 (AP)—Opening 1/2 to 1 1/2c off. Chicago wheat prices afterward held near to the initial range. Corn started 1/2 to 3/4 down and later showed but slight power to rally. Oats were easy. Provisions held about steady.

Wheat closed unsettled 1/2 to 1 1/2c net lower, corn unchanged to 1/4c off, oats unchanged to 1/4c down, and provisions at 2 to 12 advance.

Egg-Prices Drop As Hens' Output Shows Increase

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 11 (AP)—Hens are showing more inclination to lay and as a result eggs have a downward trend. Fresh standard extras dropped one cent to 25 and fresh standard firsts followed with a similar drop to 23 cents.

Butter is stationary. In the country dressed meats, choice veal was weaker at 19 1/2c, a decline of 1/2c.

Onion prices seem to be growing wings for another flight. This is in accord with predictions of dealers. Further increases may be expected any day.

Feed stuffs in the barley, oats and wheat line were also on an upward trend. Many of the bananas of the market were too unripe to be palatable.

Spinach was reported scarce. Excellent California Imperial Valley lettuce was plentiful. A carload of Crown Lion has been received which was offered \$4 to \$4.25 wholesale. Two choice heads retail at 25 cents.

STEEL SHARES IN DEMAND ON STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Jan. 11 (AP)—Heavy buying of the steel shares, based on reports of unusually favorable trade conditions, featured the irregularly higher price movement in today's stock market.

The announcement of a new public utility company by J. P. Morgan & Company interests revived speculation for the advance in the power and light stocks.

Commonwealth Power and American Water Works quickly advanced 4 1/2 points, the former to a new high at 117 1/2, and several others moved up a point or two.

Week-end profit taking assumed rather large proportions in the late afternoon, with U. S. Steel and several other leaders dropping back a couple of points from their earlier high figures.
