Mather's Luncheon Doughnuts 2 eggs, 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons salt, 2 tablespoons milk, 2 tablespoons melted shortening, 2 cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, Small bit of nutmeg. Beat the eggs, until very light and add the sugar, salt, nutmeg and shortening. Add the milk, flour and baking powder. Mix well and drop by the teaspoon into deep, hot fat. Drain and sprinkle with powdered sugar.
