HEALTH

A TEST OF EXCELLENT HEALTH FOR CHILDREN

By Hugh Chaplin, M. D. New York City.

It is not enough to know merely when our children are ill and how to cure them, we ought to know also when they are achieving the greatest degree of health possible. In order to know this we must have a standard of excellent health with which we can compare them. Parents have used such standards with their cattle for years and yet almost no similar use has been made with children.

The signs of physical health in a child may briefly be stated as follows:

The Well Built Body
Hair, plentiful and lustrous. Eyes, bright, moving normally, mucous membranes clear. Unobstructed nasal breathing. Teeth, well formed and enamel; evenly placed; grinding surfaces of double teeth meet directly; upper incisors and canines slightly overlap lower. All are clean and free from cavities. Color of mucous membranes of lips and eyes and color of the finger nails is definitely pink. Skin, slightly moist, clear and smooth.

Superficial veins—at mouth, skin plentiful and so firm that skin cannot be raised in deep thin folds between the fingers. Muscles—it is more important that all muscles should be firm and strong than that any particular group should be specially developed.

Shoulders—sloping or squarely built, but not rounded forward. Chest—broad and deep with good expansion. Arms and legs—long bones straight; joints not enlarged out of proportion with rest of limbs. Feet—arches strong and limber. Some arches are normally higher than others. Inner borders straight from heel to tip of great toe. Weight—suitable for height and age.

Properly Functioning Body
Alert, happy expression. Tongue moist, red and clear. Breath sweet. Good posture—Body balanced equally on ball and heel of foot.

feet parallel; lower abdomen held flat; none of normal curves of spine exaggerated; shoulder blades flat across back; head erect, chin in and shoulders level. Prompt, efficient muscular response.

Bodily repose.
Physical endurance. Rules for achievement: Health and vigor of the mother before birth of child and throughout nursing period. This may be secured by a generous diet, including milk, fresh vegetables and fruits and such starchy foods as bread, potatoes, rice and cereals, as well as meat, fish and eggs; plenty of pure water to drink; a moderate amount of exercise in the fresh air and sunlight; plenty of sleep with windows open; rest from avoidable worries.

For the child, regularly or meals, sufficient food of the right kind, varying in amount and kind with the age of the child; not too much food; plenty of fresh air and sunlight; plenty of sleep with windows open; a bath at least three times a week; brushing the teeth twice a day; correction of physical defects as they occur; for the detection of which physical examinations are necessary at regular intervals; happy associations and interesting things to do. Pure cod liver oil should be given during the first two years except in the heat of summer. Ten drops may be given three times a day as early as the second month if it is well digested. The quantity may be gradually increased to two teaspoons twice a day.

We should remember that it is quite as important to diagnose excellent health in children as it is to diagnose disease.
