Crown Prince Olaf To Marry Princess Martha

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 14 (AP)—The engagement of Princess Martha of Sweden to Crown Prince Olaf of Norway was officially announced today. Princess Martha, who was born March 28, 1901, is the daughter of Prince Charles, brother of King Gustav of Sweden. The crown prince was born on July 2, 1903.

Princess Martha is a sister of King Haakon and Queen Maud, who is a sister of King George of England. He is known as one of the most intrepid yachtsmen among the younger royalty of Europe. His yacht, Oslo, guided by his own hand, won the international race for six-meter yachts at the Cowes regatta in 1926. Prince Olaf studied for two years at Balliol college, Oxford.
