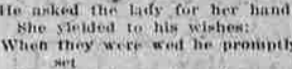

## Monacan Worries Pester Prince Of Monte Carlo

News of the upheaval came as a rude shock to Prince Louis, who is an affable, golf-loving ruler fond of a good lunch and scientific research. He inherits his late father's love of oceanography and experiments with marine life.

Prince Louis, when he received the news at his Renaissance Chateau, half a day's ride from Paris, sent shaming message to the council in which he said Monaco expected every councillor to do his duty and stand by. Nevertheless, the council risked almost immediate deposition upon receipt of the message.

Prince Pierre, husband of the crown princess of Monaco, has gone to the capital at Louis' request to untangle the problems of the toy country.

Some of the more radical people even go so far as to talk of lessening the present powers of Prince Louis. They head a movement somewhat similar to that of 1911 which relieved Prince Louis' father of his duties as absolute ruler and gave him a so-called constitutional government to share the burden with him.

The constitution provided the council of 21 members, elected once every four years. It was the council of 21 that resigned recently because its powers were not sufficiently broad, it said, to make fulfillment of its duties to the mixed Monacan possible.
