Onions Advance; Raw Milk Drops; Oranges Climb

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 14 (AP)—Outstanding in the produce market was the advancing tendency of onions. Choice stock was quoted at \$4.75 to \$5.00 wholesale. At retail this quality could be purchased at from 2 pounds to four pounds for a quarter.

Butter was much cheaper. Butlers on the market offered these at five cents a pound.

California celery was holding firm at \$4.50 to \$4.75. Hearts were selling for 20 cents as the top price, while the bunch celery was held at two for 25 cents.

Larger sized oranges advanced 22 cents.

Wheat Higher At Close of Market

CHICAGO, Jan. 14 (AP)—Corn started at 1/2c off to 1/2c up, and subsequently established sharp gains all around. Wheat opened 1/2c to 3/4c higher, advancing further, but gains failed to hold well. Oats were firmer. Provisions tended to be steady.

OREGON EXPORT FIGURES GIVEN

Nearly 60 Million Bushels of Wheat Sent Out, Market Agent Says

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 14 (AP)—During 1927 and 1928, excepting December, 1928, a total of 59,889,462 bushels of wheat were exported from Oregon, says the biennial report of Seymour Jones, state market agent. Of this, 57,189,371 was inspected and 22,709,931 not inspected. The receipt of wheat during the same period was 69,312,897 bushels.

Flour Export

The export of flour during the period was 1,952,569 barrels. The income of the department for the two years was \$270,875 and the expenses \$244,278.29, a difference of \$26,596.71.

When the grain inspection was created the legislature appropriated \$7500 for its support until it became self-sustaining with the provision that this amount should be returned to the state. Subsequently in 1917 and 1919 it was necessary for the emergency board to allow money to the department, the original appropriation having been insufficient. These amounts with the original appropriation totaled \$21,225.39.

Feasibility Recommendation

Persons conducting public warehouses for the storage of grain and hay are required to pay a license fee of \$2. Jones recommends that the fee be increased "in order that a more thorough inspection and examination be made of the warehouses and the responsibility of those persons conducting this business."
