Here and There In Legislature

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 15 (AP)—Secretaries of chambers of commerce and similar promotion organizations will be placed on the railroad pass of reduced fare lists if a bill to be introduced by Senator Elliot of Polk and Benton counties is enacted into law. The measure would authorize the public service commission to extend that privilege to the promotion secretaries.
The Ladies' Garden club of Corvallis is asking for the introduction of a bill providing for highway beautification by the elimination of advertising boards and other advertising devices along the roads. It is believed there will be opposition from rural producers who sell their produce at stands along the highways.
In its biennial report, made public today, the state reclamation commission recommends that irrigation districts be relieved from obligation of repaying to the state money that has been advanced for the payment of interest on district bonds. Also the commission recommends repeal of the interest guarantee act under which these advances have been made.

HEAVY WORK LOOMING FOR LEGISLATURE

The senate met at 10:30 o'clock and immediately adjourned. Members of the Oregon legislature were showing their first signs of serious discord this morning as the session swung into its second day and there were prospects of an eruption on the floor of the house over the patronage issue.
Proceeding under a prearranged understanding between the senate and house leaders a plan to consolidate some of the important committees of the two houses to accomplish economies in clerical hire had gained some headway yesterday when it was discovered by some of the members that practically all their usual patronage was being taken away from them, and that there was nothing they could do for the 150 or more girls and women who besieged them for jobs.
Fully organized in record time both houses had swung into action before adjournment last night and the first bills to be introduced had dropped into the hopper. Two were introduced in the senate and 140 in the house. Of the latter 137 came from special repeal of laws committee appointed two years ago to cull out obsolete sections of Oregon law and amend others to eliminate conflicts.
14 Measures Being Checked. None of the bills dealing with the major subjects of proposed legislation for this session have yet made their appearance. The 14 measures designed to carry into effect the recommendations of the Carlin Tax Investigating commission, including the income tax and excise tax bills, have been completed but are still in the hands of the committee for checking.
Chairman Carlin announces that he expects to introduce most of them during the first week.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 15 (AP)—Licenses held by from 15 to 20 second-rate hotels and rooming houses will be revoked and their proprietors investigated, Stanley Myers, district attorney, said here today, if the story of a widespread vice organization, told by a girl of 21, is corroborated. The girl, who said she had been a member of the ring, was induced to tell her story by the Pacific Protective association.
She told a tale of cooperation between hotel and rooming house keepers, taxi men and policemen, all living from the earnings of a large group of young girls.
The evidence, said to be supported by affidavits, is now in the hands of the district attorney's office. Myers said a complete investigation would follow.
