Epidemic Wanes But Demand for Vicks Continues

SECOND WAVE FEARED

Public health officials now report a decline in the number of flu cases. They urge everybody, however, to keep on taking precautions against colds for fear of a second and more severe flu wave, as in 1918.

There is, besides, the risk of deep chest colds, bronchitis, and pneumonia, which normally reach their peak between now and April and which have a double danger this year with so many people in the run-down condition which follows a flu attack.

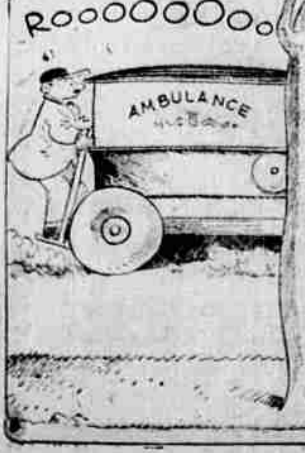

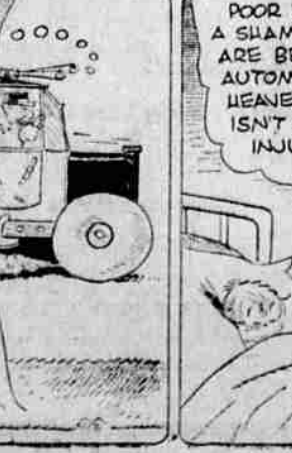
