## MENUS

BREAKFAST—Baked eggs, cereal, cream, creamed bacon and eggs on toast, extra toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Rice croquettes with cheese sauce, celery, apple and raisin salad, baking powder biscuits, milk, tea.

DINNER—Raw Oysters, with brown bread sticks, pan-broiled lamb chops with mint jelly, twice baked potatoes, creamed carrots and peas, jellied vegetable salad, chocolate and nut pudding, milk, coffee.

An attractive and sensible way to serve mint jelly is on a slice of orange. The combination of flavors is delicious and the orange prevents the jelly from running all over one's plate.

Rice Croquettes with Cheese Sauce  
One-half cup rice, 1 cup milk, 1 cup water, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 egg, 1/2 teaspoon onion juice, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, fine bread crumbs.

Wash rice thoroughly and place in sauce pan. Add cold-water to cover and bring quickly to the boiling point. Boil five minutes, drain, rinse in cold water and drain again. Put milk and water in top of double boiler, add salt and cook until rice is tender and liquid is absorbed. Stir in butter and add egg well beaten. Add onion juice and pepper and spread on a platter to cool. When cool, shape in small croquettes and roll in crumbs. Dip in egg slightly beaten and roll again in crumbs. Fry in deep hot fat until a golden brown. Serve with—

Cheese Sauce  
Two tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 cup milk, 1/2 cup grated cheese, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika.

Melt butter, stir in flour and when mixture bubbles slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Season with salt and paprika and add cheese. Bring to the boiling point and serve.
