**Make Less Ten-Cent Bars**—The day of the ten cent candy bar is about extinct, says J. P. Murphy, of San Francisco, representative of a candy company, who is a visitor in La Grande. Mr. Murphy says the ten cent bars contain more candy than the average person wants to eat at one time. Mr. Murphy began his first tour of the northwest and he expresses himself as enamored of it. "The people of the northwest are more pleasant and friendly than the Californians," he says. "The people and the scenery, both seem more natural in this section to him. Business men in the Northwest, however, are as much 'on their toes' as are the California business men, he says.

**22 Per Cent Salt**—Twenty-two per cent of the Great Salt lake in Utah is salt, says E. H. Beach, representative of a salt company. Mr. Beach is a visitor in La Grande this week. Salt Lake City firms manufacture an average of 150,000 tons a year, he says. The process used is based on evaporation. Water from the lake is pumped into a settling basin in April where it stays until October. By that time the sun has evaporated all the water leaving the salt. The salt from the lake is 99 per cent pure, he says. The vogue for iodized salt has come in during the last four or five years. Mr. Beach says, and now much of the table salt which is sold in cans, has iodine in it. The states of Oregon and Idaho are the largest consumers of the iodized salt, he declares.
