BAGSHAW OUSTED BY HUSKY BOARD

Student Organization's Power to Act Questioned by Faculty Body

SEATTLE, Jan. 15 (AP)—Enoch Bagshaw was relieved of his duties as head coach of the University of Washington football team early today by the student board of control. But the faculty of the board's action was questioned by the faculty athletic committee which heretofore has approved all actions of the board relative to coaches.

Under the board's order Bagshaw is to remain under his three year contract at full pay, totaling about \$25,000, but is to be assigned other duties.

Status Undetermined The board's action served neither to settle the debate as to the value of the "little giant" as a football coach nor to determine his exact status.

It opened, for the first time in the history of the University, the question of the exact power of the student board, of the faculty athletic committee in passing on actions relating to coaches, and of Dr. M. Lyle Spencer, president of the university and arbiter in disputes between the board and the committee.

Following an announcement at the board's executive session that Dr. Spencer had ruled that its action was final, the faculty committee declared that the president had assured its members that they had power to reverse the board.

Action Postponed An attempt of the board to empower the graduate manager, Earl Campbell to employ a new head coach was postponed until this afternoon. In the interim student leaders and the athletic committee were to confer with Dr. Spencer for a definite ruling on whether the board's action was final. The committee announced that it would reverse the board if possible.

Student leaders carefully refrained from expressing their objections to Bagshaw during an open meeting which preceded the executive session. But when they were closeted they declared that "Baggy" was generally unpopular that the majority of the student body had lost confidence in him, that he lacked drawing power at the gate, that he failed to draw football material from state high schools, that his continued presence as head coach would be at a financial loss to the student body, and that he would have to be removed at some time and there was no use dodging the issue longer.

Proponents in Majority Bagshaw's supporters, however, said they had no intention of dropping their fight until every means of retaining him in his present capacity had failed. Rumors were current that if the board's action stands the assistant coaches and the faculty committee will walk out. They refused to discuss their plans.

Bagshaw's proponents were far in the majority among speakers at an open meeting that preceded the executive session of the board. Several men, mostly former football players, spoke in favor of the coach while three alumni urged that his contract be bought outright.

Among those that supported Bagshaw were Chuck Carroll, all-American halfback; Paul Jessup, captain elect; Clarence Dirks, 1928 captain, and George Gutormsen, 1924 captain.

They all declared that Bagshaw was an excellent coach, that the football players liked him and that his opposition was from those who had never fought on the gridiron.

Bagshaw's Interpretation "The attitude of the board of control," Bagshaw said, "in voting to relieve me of my duties as head football coach merely indicates on their part their desire to evade the issue. It was my understanding that I was to be hired as head football coach and that in addition I was to perform such other additional duties as the board might assign to me.

"I am relieved as head coach. That means in plain language to me that I am fired.

"I can make no other interpretation of the situation."

The board's vote, after several hours discussion was 11 to 2 against Bagshaw. Smith Troy, president of the student body who had called the special meeting, did not vote.

Last Night's Basketball

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 15 (Special)—It has been said that a basketball coach is no better than his record. If that is true, then Billy Reinhardt, coach at Oregon, is the best basketball coach in the northwest, for Billy's teams have won more conference games from each of their northern opponents than they lost.

In the five years that Billy has been coaching at Oregon, no team of his has ever lost to Montana or Washington State. The records show that Reinhardt-coached quintets have beaten the Cougars 10 and the Grizzlies six consecutive times.

Washington has made the best showing against Oregon of any of the Northwest's northern opponents. The Huskies lost six games to Oregon and won four. Idaho and Oregon State college were each defeated seven out of 10 times by the Wolfpack.

Reinhardt's sum total of regularly scheduled conference games includes 36 victories as compared to 10 losses, four of which came in his first year as coach.

TRY "IRON MAN" STUNT

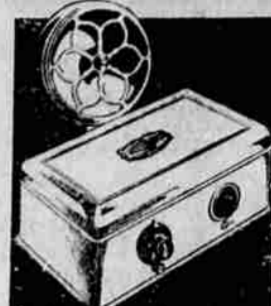

Leo Lomski Is Favored to Win Over Braddock

NEW YORK, Jan. 18 (AP)—Leo Lomski, of Aberdeen, Wash., will be a 7 to 5 favorite over James J. Braddock, of Jersey City, when they enter the ring for their ten-round battle in Madison Square Garden tonight.

He was on the short end of the betting when he battled Turky Griffith in the Garden some time ago but knocked out the highly-touted Sioux City light heavy-weight in two rounds.

Lomski, however, is one of the greatest of the present crop of light heavy-weights. A crossing, smashing, tearing type of fighter he has held his own with the best of the 175-pounders. He had the title within his grasp in the Garden last year when he spilled Tommy Loughran, ruler of the division, onto the canvas. He could not keep the title-holder down, however, and Tommy danced and jabbed his way to the decision.

Braddock got little notice from the experts until he broke Pete Latzo's jaw with a right hand punch. He followed this victory up with the sensational knockout of Griffiths. That earned him the bout with Lomski. Some of Leo's opponents would say that Braddock is not getting much of a "break" in tackling a rival as rugged and experienced as Lomski.

DETROIT TIGERS HOPE FOR TONIC

Bucky Harris, Manager, Says He Isn't Promising Anything Yet

By William H. Beatty, (Associated Press Staff Writer) DETROIT, Jan. 18 (AP)—In the spare figure of Stanley Raymond "Bucky" Harris—who says he isn't promising anything—rest the hopes of Detroit baseball fans that an ailing Detroit Tiger this season will receive a stimulating tonic.

Harris, who takes George Moriarty's place as manager of the Detroit American league club, at present is engaged in giving the Tiger a thorough overhauling. He has refused, however, to make any predictions regarding the animal's health during the coming season.

Few Regulars Back Few regulars will be back, and even fewer of those will be certain of their places. Bucky has announced Charles Gehring, Harry and Marty McManus of the infield; Jonathan Stone and Harry Rice, outfielder; Owen Carroll and Vic Sorrell, pitchers, are among those fairly certain of appearing in the lineup.

Weakest in pitching, the Detroit club, which finished in sixth place last year, will have a revised staff. Heading the list is George Uhlir, brought from Cleveland in a trade which took Ken Holloway, pitcher, and Jackie Tavener, shortstop, from Toronto to the minors comes Johnny Prudden, a right hand-

er, who is expected to develop into a headliner. Carroll, Sorrell, Haskell, Billings and Earl Whitehill of last year's team will be available, while Lit Stoner and Sam Gibson are on the doubtful list. No changes have been made in the coaching staff to date. Larry Woodall, Mervin Rhin and Bill Hargrave are on the roster, and Ed Phillips of Toronto, who worked out with the club during training last year, is a possibility.

Johnston Secured

The coast league has been drawn upon to furnish Roy Johnston, of San Francisco, designed for the right field berth. Johnston is a slugger, holding close to .400 last year, and Bucky has high hopes for him. "Fat Robert" Fothergill, who is having his pounding troubles, probably will be utility outfielder.

Hollman may have to stage a battle for first base position with Dale Alexander, international league who was acquired this year. He is the shortstop candidate, replacing Tavener. Chick Gallaway remains to give Schubele competition.

Tables Reversed Tables are reversed for Bucky and George Melride. When Bucky was holding down second sack at Washington, Melride was his manager. Now Melride, as coach this year for Detroit, is working for his old employer.

With President Frank Navis, a new half owner of the Detroit club appears in the person of Walter O. Briggs, automobile body manufacturer. Briggs, however, is not expected to take an active part of the club's management.

The Detroit club will go to Phoenix, Ariz., for the training season.
