

ELECT AL SMITH TRUST DIRECTOR

Radio Appeal to Democratic Party Successful; Check Flood Results

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (AP)—The declaration that if he were able to do so he would free the democratic party from "unwarranted influence and republican control" was made in the house today by Representative Box, of Texas, the minority whip, who recently recommended that the party eliminate control of elements sympathetic to Alfred E. Smith.

NEW YORK, Jan. 18 (AP)—Alfred E. Smith has been elected a director of the country trust com-

pany of New York. The matter of the chairmanship had not been determined and would not be until after the return of Mr. Smith from a vacation in the south, it is said. Should Mr. Smith accept the chairmanship he would have to devote the greater part of his time to the affairs of the trust company, while a mere membership on the board would leave him free to undertake some other commercial venture as his main effort.

The County Trust company opened for business on February 23, 1925, with a capital of \$1,000,000 and a surplus of \$500,000. Mr. Smith, then governor, was its first director. The bank's total assets on Wednesday were reported as \$29,579,185.54 and the capital, surplus and undivided profits on the same day amounted to \$2,123,175.11.

RADIO APPEAL SUCCESSFUL
NEW YORK, Jan. 18 (AP)—The radio appeal of Alfred E. Smith for contributions to wipe

out the \$1,500,000 deficit of the democratic party has brought an avalanche of checks and pledges of funds. Hundreds of letters, accompanied by checks ranging from \$5 to \$100, and telegrams promising checks to follow by mail have been received by Mr. Smith, John J. Raabok, national chairman, and James W. Gerard, treasurer of the national committee. No attempt has been made to total the amount received.

Virtually every contributor has requested from one to 100 copies of the book containing Mr. Smith's campaign speeches, which he announced would be given each contributor of \$2 or more who requested it.

A request for 100 copies of the book was received from Mayor Otto Bernstein, of Monroe, La., who telegraphed: "I obligate myself to take 100 copies of your speeches during your great effort to perpetuate the democratic party. I think what you are doing is the greatest

effort on the part of one man our common country has ever witnessed."

A telegram from Mrs. A. L. Love, of Ottumwa, Iowa, read: "My compliments—Matthew 5, 11 and 12."

The scriptural verses referred to read:

"Blessed are ye when men shall revile you and persecute you and shall say all manner of evil things against you falsely, for my sake."

"Rejoice and be exceedingly glad, for great is your reward in Heaven; for so persecuted they the prophets which were before you."

Here and There In Legislature

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 18 (AP)—President Nophald of the state senate will introduce a bill Monday providing that graduates of the law school of the University of Oregon shall be admitted to the practice of law in Oregon upon submission of their diplomas and without further examination.

At present the board of bar examiners of the State Bar association conducts an examination each year which must be passed by all persons wishing to practice in the state, regardless of what schools have given certificates.

Senator Nophald explains that practically all eastern states admit applicants on their diplomas if the diplomas are from the state institutions.

Senator Nophald will introduce a bill providing that the state of Oregon take over the lease of the training school grounds of the Oregon national guard on Clatsop plains in Clatsop county. This was recommended by Governor Patterson in his message.

The lease dates from March 1, 1927, to February 28, 1927, and provides that the state or federal government may buy the tract of 363 acres at any time during the life of the lease, for the sum of \$25,000. Clatsop county has spent \$15,000 in the construction of a road into the camp, and the citizens of the county have paid the lease for the first two years, which is \$2,255.50 annually. The land is privately owned. The Nophald bill will provide for a continuing appropriation of that amount each year.

In the hope of relieving the state from the expense, however, Nophald will also introduce a memorial to congress asking that the federal government buy the grounds. Government army inspectors have pronounced the tract the best national guard training ground in the United States.
