JAVA VOLCANO IN ACTIVITY; NO LIFE LOSS

BATAVIA, Java, Jan. 19 (AP)—Four thousand eruptions during the past 24 hours are reported to have taken place on the famous island volcano, Krakatau which is showing a rapid increase in its renewed activities.

Eye witnesses report that burning material has been hurled several thousand feet high with vapor clouds some still higher, affording an imposing spectacle, as the crater added to the impressive scene. Unceasing tremors are felt on the sea.

No loss of life or damage has been reported thus far from the volcanic activities on isolated Krakatau, which already have lasted many months.
