WOULD PROTECT WATERSHED
WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (AP).—Representative Hawley, republican, Oregon, yesterday introduced a bill to set aside that part of Crater national forest, which forms a watershed for the water supply of the city of Ashland, Jackson County, Oregon. The measure would prohibit the sale or cutting of timber from the area without the consent of the governmental body of the city of Ashland.

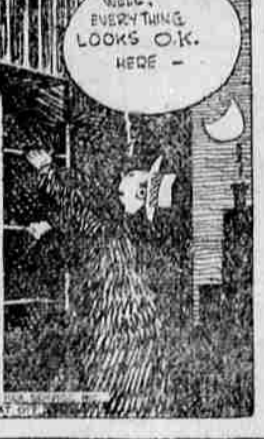
