Negro's Part In World Literature Is Club Subject

An interesting and educational program was held yesterday afternoon by the La Grande Neighborhood club on the subject of "The Negro's Part in World Literature."

Mrs. Harvey P. Matthews was in charge of the program which included a short history of the literary work of the negro, reading of negro poetry and a discussion of it, negro musical selections and other features that all served to illustrate the theme of the afternoon's study.

Mrs. Leal Russell sang a group of two negro spirituals, "Standing in the Need of Prayer," and "Swing Low Sweet Chariot." She also sang "The Last Long Rest," the words for which were written by Paul Lawrence Dunbar, the famous negro poet and the music by Carrie Jacobs Bond.

A talk by Mrs. Matthews on the history of negro literature was illustrated by the reading of negro poems by Mrs. George Birnie, Miss Mary Naughton, Hendrickson and Miss Mary Gould Parsons.

Miss Mabel Doty told of the contemporary negro poet, Countee Cullen, recounting the story of his rise to fame as a poet in spite of obstacles. Miss Doty illustrated the life with selections read from "Copies Sent," a collection of delightful poems written by Cullen.

"The Harlem Dancer," was the title of a naive poem which was read by Mrs. Birnie.

The work of two world famous writers, Dumas, the Frenchman, and Pushkin, the Russian, both of direct negro descent, was touched on by Mrs. Matthews in her sketch of the history of the contribution of the negro race to the field of literature.

Mrs. Matthews told of the almost insurmountable barrier of race prejudice to the rise of the negro as a race. The barrier, she said, has caused the energies of the negro to be centered in the conflict between the blacks and whites instead of being turned to literature and educational accomplishment.

The second woman in the United States to be acknowledged as a writer and one of first women to have a book published was Phillis Wheatley, a negro, of colonial times, Mrs. Matthews said.

MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST—Orange juice, cereal, cream, codfish balls with tomato sauce, corn bread, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Surprise baked potatoes, steamed spinach, whole wheat bread, "food for the gods", milk, tea.

DINNER—Stuffed pork tenderloin, scalloped sweet potatoes and apples, cabbage, celery and nut salad, peach Bavarian cream, milk, coffee.

The recipe for "food for the gods" is given in reply to a request.

Food for the Gods
Six eggs (whites), 2 cups granulated sugar, 6 tablespoons cracker crumbs, 2 teaspoons baking powder, ½ pound nut meats, ½ pound stoned dates, few grains salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Chop nuts and dates. Mix and sift sugar and baking powder and salt. Add with cracker crumbs and vanilla to nuts and dates and mix thoroughly. Fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry on a platter with a wire whisk. Turn into a lightly buttered mold and bake one hour in a slow oven. Serve with whipped cream.

This rule will serve 10 persons generously. Half the recipe can be used if a smaller amount is wanted. Be sure to use half of each ingredient required.

Gunfire Precedes Chicago Election

(CHICAGO, Jan. 23 (AP)—Gunfire last night became the harbinger of another Chicago election. The shooting took place in the 31st ward where Frank Konkowski, an attorney, is seeking election as Alderman, opposing Stanley Adamkewicz, incumbent.

Windows of three establishments were shattered by shotgun slugs fired by three men crashing through the ward in an automobile. The shots were fired at the offices of Konkowski and into the stores of two of his supporters.

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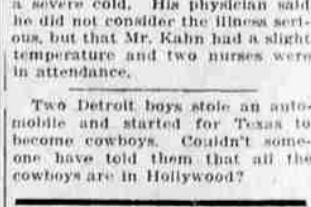
