PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 23 (AP)—With the exception of standards in butter, which went up 1/2 cent, the market for both eggs and butter was unchanged today.

Tomatoes, repacked, and lettuce were fractionally lower. Spinach experienced a slight advance because of scarcity, while onions took another flight of 25 cents.

Tangerines are on the market at \$2.50 for half an orange box wholesale.

Artichokes, because of large quantities received, are somewhat cheaper.

Other fruits and vegetables were stationary.

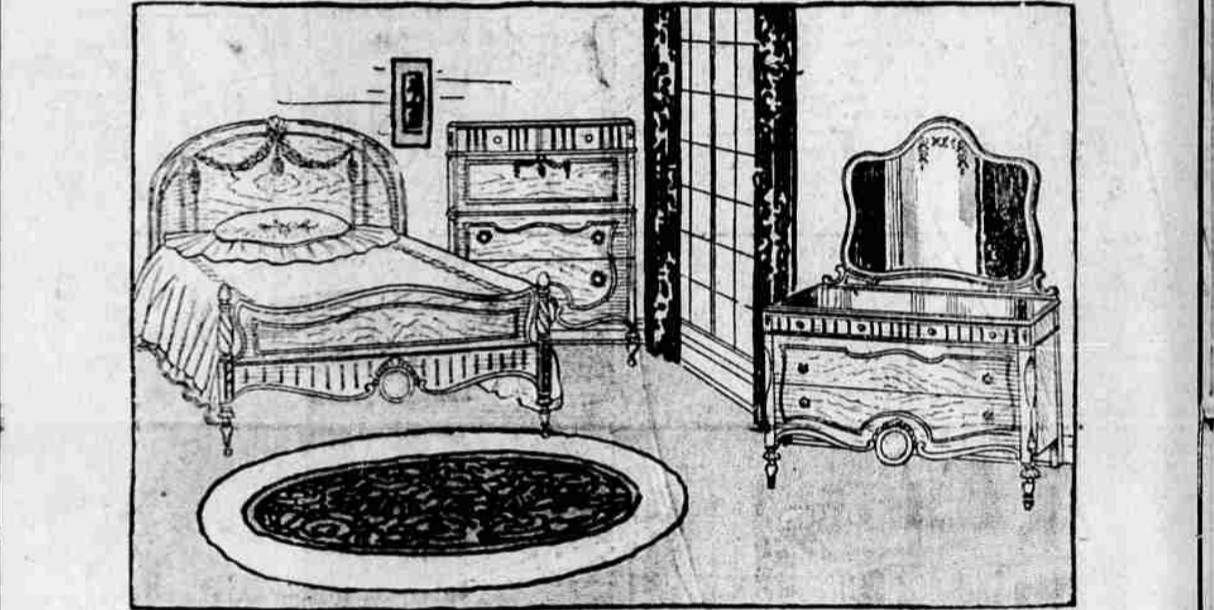
