National League Race Is Viewed Through Rose-Tinted Glasses

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 24 (AP)—With new and sparkling material and most of the weak gaps apparently plugged up, the Phillies look toward the 1929 National League pennant race through rose-tinted glasses.

Not since the championship days of 1915 and 1916 have they boasted of such excellent prospects or felt so hopeful over an approaching baseball season.

New blood has been brought into nearly every position, the pitching staff has been strengthened and the Phillies have a great young shortstop in Tommy Thoenow, for whom they are reported to have given three players and \$50,000 in cash.

Two Vets Sold
One of Manager Burt Shotton's most recent moves was to cast aside two veterans, Jimmy Ring, pitcher, who was given his unconditional release, and John Schulte, who was sold to Columbus, of the American association.

Don Hess, who hit 14 home runs last season, will be on first base and Fresno Thompson on second with Thoenow at shortstop, Pinky Whitney, who batted over 300 last year, will be at third to round out a well-balanced infield. An infield reserve is Manager Shotton has Terry Lyons, from the Cardinals of St. Louis; Fibere, and Joe O'Rourke, son of the Phillies' chief scout.

Strong Outfield
The outfield will be composed of Lefty O'Doul, obtained from the New York Giants; Denny Southern, a youngster from Houston, Texas, and Chuck Klein, with Cy Williams, home run slugger, as the leading hitters.

Leslie, Davis and Susce will be in charge of the catching department. Susce is a youngster from the University of Pittsburgh.

Should he be able to obtain an experienced relief pitcher, Manager Shotton said he would not hesitate to peddle the Phillies would finish among the leaders.

Augment Pitching Staff
The regular staff of Hedges, Millan, Ferguson, Hesch, Stewart, Metzer, Ulrich, and Wittoughly has been augmented by five youngsters. Caldwell, from Waco; Phil Collins from New Orleans; and Luther Ray from Birmingham, are considered the most promising of the younger pitchers. Then there are Walker, a Philadelphia boy, and Derhan, a product of the Virginia league.

The Phillies will start spring training at Winter Haven, Fla., with their best prospects in season.

Nurmi Aims At Two-Mile Mark; Schedules Races

NEW YORK, Jan. 24 (AP)—The world's indoor two-mile record, a mark of 8 minutes, 53 1-5 seconds which he set four years ago, seems to be the first object of attack in Taavo Nurmi's second American campaign. Clearing up the first dispute about his services before the registration committee of the Metropolitan association of the Amateur Athletic Union, Nurmi announced his schedule for the winter campaign on the boards and the first three races are at two miles.

After warming up last week at the cold distance of 2,000 yards, Nurmi will return a standard distance at the William C. Prout Memorial games of the Boston K. C. Saturday in a first attempt to break the most sensational of his records.

The Finnish phantom, with his thinning blonde hair showing the four years that have passed since his first American invasion, has a job ahead of him in the conquest of the two mile record. The one time his hitching stride carried him over the boards in 5:28 1-5. Just a week after he ran his brilliant 4:12 mile, the only mark under nine minutes for two miles on the record books. At that time the outdoor record of 9:09 2-5 had stood for more than 20 years and it was only last summer that Edwin Wide of Sweden reduced it to 8:01 2-5.

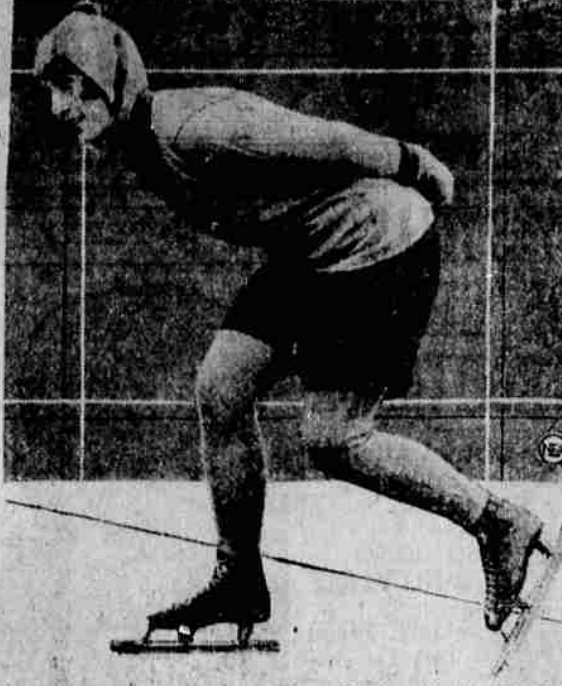
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Fastest Woman on Ice

PURDUE LEADS BIG TEN HOOP RACE SINCE '18

CHICAGO, Jan. 24 (AP)—Purdue and Northwestern are the top and bottom teams of the Big Ten basketball world, statistics covering the era from 1918 to the near-midway stage of the present championship race reveal.

Winning 86 games and losing but 43, the Hoosiers are far in front of the field with a grand average of .667, while Northwestern has won but 29 out of 127 for the lowly average of .307.

Regardless of the outcome of the present race, Purdue will hang onto its all-time leadership as its closest competitor, Wisconsin, could win its remaining games while the Hoosiers lose all of theirs and still be behind.

Purdue is tied with Wisconsin in the business of winning Big Ten basketball championships, however. Each school has won one and tied for three, since 1918.

ROCKFORD, Ill., Jan. 24 (AP)—Sammy Mandell is ready at any time to defend his lightweight title, but he would like to know from Paul Pohn, president of the National Boxing association, just who he is supposed to defend it against, and who will take care of the guarantee.

Pohn yesterday announced that the titles of four champions, including Mandell, would be declared forfeit in the 21 states by members of the N. B. A. If the men did not defend them within a specified time.

"Does Pohn want to take the responsibility of finding somebody for me to fight?" inquired Mandell. "Will he put up the guarantee?"

Other champions named in the association's order, were Tommy Laughran, light heavyweight; Mickey Walker, middleweight; and Joe Dunfee, welterweight.
